The Global Humanitarian Overview (GHO) for 2021 was launched on 1 December 2020 to help 160 million of the 235 million most vulnerable people who face hunger, conflict, displacement, the impacts of climate change and the COVID-19 pandemic in 56 countries. As of 31 December, adjusted requirements for 45 appeals were \$37.7 billion to assist 174 million of the 250 million people in need in 59 countries.

Funding for the GHO 2021 was \$18.2 billion or 48 per cent of requirements at the end of December, with significant new funding reported since the end of November for the Syria, Iraq, Yemen and Ethiopia plans, as well as the plans for the Syria Region and Rohingya crises. Both the amount received for the GHO and the coverage of needs are higher than at the same time in 2020 (\$17.9 billion and 46 per cent, respectively). Coverage of the plans in the GHO varies widely, with only 20 out of 45 appeals funded at or above the global average.

Total reported humanitarian funding of \$26.4 billion is also higher than at the end of December 2020 (\$25.7 billion).

The GHO 2022 launched on 2 December 2021 requires \$41 billion to assist 183 million of the 235 million people in need in 63 countries.

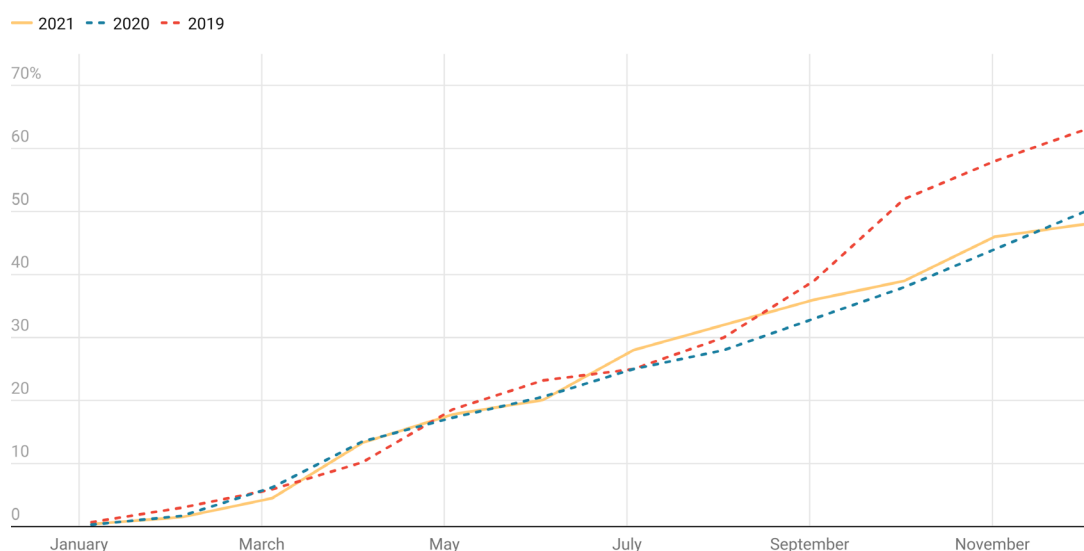

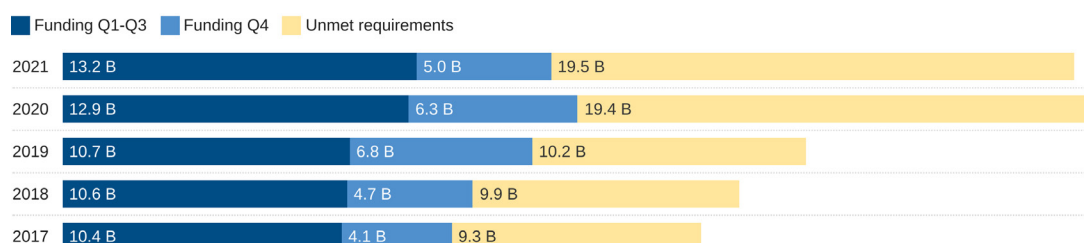


Monthly and quarterly funding trends

Month-by-month funding coverage from January – September 2021 was similar in percentage terms to the patterns observed in the same months in 2019 and 2020.



Despite similar funding patterns early in the year, fourth quarter funding, slowed in 2021 compared to 2020. Unmet requirements were similar both years and substantially greater (almost double on average) than in 2017 – 2019.



Gender-Based Violence

Requirements to prevent, mitigate and respond to gender-based violence (GBV) in 2021 currently stand at \$747 million. As of end December, reported funding had increased to \$207 million or 28 per cent of what was needed. This amount does not include \$55 million shared among different sectors, or funding not reported for organizations/activities in the Global Humanitarian Overview. Accurate reporting on funding earmarked for GBV activities, as well as funding made available through the allocation of unearmarked funds, is crucial for gap identification and advocacy. In November and December 2021, the Emergency Relief Coordinator Martin Griffiths allocated \$79.9 million from the CERF rapid response (RR) window.

Ethiopia received two allocations worth \$25 million to support people affected by conflict and displacement in the north (\$20 million) and by drought in the south (\$5 million). Somalia also received \$25 million in support of drought-affected populations. Further allocations related to natural disasters include \$12.9 million due to floods in South Sudan and \$12 million to people affected by Super Typhoon Rai in the Philippines. Finally, \$5 million were allocated to support the humanitarian response to newly displaced people in Burkina Faso.

CERF allocates \$25 million to support people in Ethiopia affected by conflict and drought.

On 15 November 2021, the ERC allocated \$25 million from CERF for an urgent response to conflict and drought in Ethiopia. Most of the funding, \$20 million, will support the humanitarian response to conflict and displacement in northern Ethiopia, including Tigray, Amhara and Afar regions, targeting 1.2 million affected people. An additional \$5 million will support an early response to the worsening drought in the south and southeast of the country, in Somali and Oromia regions, as well as anticipatory action ahead of a possible fourth poor rainy season and worsening food insecurity in early 2022.

Barbacoas, Colombia. The village of Barbacoas has been heavily affected by armed conflict, and the impact of COVID-19 led to increased violence against women and made access to care and justice more difficult. CERF, implemented by Fundeas and local municipalities, aims to strengthen the emergency response to gender-based violence. Resilience kits with emergency aid, food, hygiene kits were delivered to women-headed households, and education materials regarding referrals for violence, food security, and COVID-19 prevention. *UN Women*

CERF allocates \$25 million for early action in response to drought in Somalia

On 19 October 2021, the ERC allocated \$8 million to support drought-affected people in Somalia. The country is experiencing severe drought conditions after two consecutive failed rainy seasons, especially affecting the southwest of the country. The current rainy season was also forecast to be poor and has so far indeed been below average. This has led to shortages of food and water, threatened peoples' livelihoods, and increased the risk of communicable diseases. In the last quarter of 2021, 3.5 million people (22% of the population) were expected to face food insecurity, and 1.2 million children were likely to be acutely malnourished. This allocation serves a dual purpose. First, it will fund immediate humanitarian action targeting more than 606,000 of the most vulnerable people in Jubaland and South West State. This action focuses on unconditional cash assistance as the main response, which will help households meet their basic food needs and prevent the depletion of livelihood assets. Other priority areas include livestock treatment, the provision of drinking water and health care services. Second, part of this allocation will be used to fund services in anticipation of worsening food insecurity, thus aiming to mitigate the impact of deteriorating conditions. On 7 December, a second allocation of \$17 million was endorsed by the ERC due to the severity of the crisis.

ERC allocates \$12.9 million to respond to floods in South Sudan

On 18 November, ERC Martin Griffiths endorsed an allocation of \$12.9 million from CERF for an urgent response to large-scale flooding in South Sudan. 809,000 people have been affected by massive flooding in many parts of the country, compounded by an escalation of violence in areas such as Tambura. Humanitarian agencies have scaled up their response to meet the affected people's needs. This is the third year in a row that large parts of South Sudan have been flooded and this CERF allocation contributes to the response to one of the worst and most prolonged of the floods. UN agencies and their partners will provide humanitarian assistance and protection to people impacted by the floods who have limited or no access to basic services and supplies.

Pre-emptive evacuations were organized for families and children living in vulnerable vicinities in Catarman, Northern Samar. CERF releases \$5 million to support displaced populations in Burkina Faso

On 15 December, the ERC endorsed a \$5 million allocation from CERF for an urgent response to new displacement in Burkina Faso. Since 1 November 2021, 73,217 people, including more than 50,000 people in the Centre Nord region, have been newly displaced according to rapid counts by regional authorities. Additional displacements continue to be reported daily. This trend is expected to persist in the coming weeks and months. The CERF funding will enable UN agencies and partners to provide life-saving assistance to internally displaced persons and host community members across four sectors: water, sanitation and hygiene (WASH); food security; shelter and essential household items; and common logistics services.

ERC allocates \$12 million to typhoon response in Philippines

On 23 December, the ERC allocated \$12 million from CERF for an urgent response to Super Typhoon Rai (locally known as Odette) in the Philippines. Super Typhoon Rai/Odette struck the Philippines on 16 and 17 December 2021, causing widespread damage across the Visayas and Mindanao Islands. A state of calamity was officially declared on 20 December and the humanitarian country team released a 'needs and priorities' overview on 24 December, calling for \$107.5 million to address the multi-sectoral needs of 530,000 people in Regions VIII and XIII, in support of the Government's response efforts. With CERF funding, UN agencies and partners are providing life-saving assistance to 244,800 people, including 71,800 women, 73,600 men and 99,400 children.

Disbursements per pooled fund

In November, CBPFs disbursed \$55.6 million to humanitarian partners in ten countries. CBPFs disbursed around 59.5 per cent of funding to NGOs in November including \$11.3 million to local and national partners and \$21.8 to international NGOs. In December, CBPFs disbursed \$57.7 million to humanitarian partners in ten countries. CBPFs disbursed around 90.7 per cent of funding to NGOs in November, including \$12.7 million to local and national partners and \$39.7 to international NGOs.

Overall in 2021, CBPFs have released \$880.6M (this includes \$254.4 million in pipeline projects under Grant Agreement signature), including 37 per cent to national and local partners and 43 per cent to international NGOs. As of 31 December 2021, donors had generously contributed and pledged a total of \$1.12 billion to 20 CBPFs.

Twelve new allocation rounds were launched in November:

- **Afghanistan Humanitarian Fund (HF): \$105 million** to provide winterization support, including in underserved and hardest-to-reach areas and urban settings characterized by overcrowding, poor living conditions and lack access to clean water. The allocation will strengthen the involvement of local and national NGOs in the response.

- **CAR HF: \$7 million** to provide emergency health services, improve camp, shelter and WASH conditions and will prioritize AAP and disability-inclusion.
- **Iraq HF: \$12 million** to prioritize out-of-camp IDPs and vulnerable returnees in underserved areas through an integrated response focusing on multipurpose cash assistance, women and girls, GBV and disability-inclusion. The allocation will promote the involvement of NNGOs.
- **Lebanon HF: \$6 million** focusing on child protection, GBV-services and emergency education in line with the Lebanon Emergency Response Plan (ERP).
- **Myanmar HF: \$4 million** to provide timely resources for critical life-saving activities in priority geographical areas and clusters with extended requirements due to tconflict and protracted crises in the country. The allocation will target displaced people with specific vulnerabilities, including age, gender, disability and ethnicity, and will strengthen the role of civil society organizations in the response.
- **Somalia HF: \$6 million** to respond to needs created by a rise of intercommunal violence and fighting between government forces and non-state armed actors taking place in several regions of Sudan. These conflicts have led to mass displacement of both local populations and IDPs already living camps. The allocation covers urgent critical needs for IDPs and host communities and provides improved WASH conditions, shelter and non-food items, health and protection services.
- **Sudan HF: \$9.4 million** in response to a sudden increase in accessibility at the end of 2021 in some areas that had been cut off from humanitarian assistance and basic services for almost two decades. The allocation will focus on protection, education, food security, improved WASH conditions and health services. **\$6.1 million** will support local populations and IDPs who are newly displaced due to a rise of intercommunal violence and fighting between government forces and non-state armed actors in several regions. The allocation covers urgent critical needs for IDPs and host communities and provides improved WASH conditions, shelter and NFI, health and protection services. **\$1.4 million** to provide emergency health and nutrition services, enhance protection and improve WASH for IDPs and host communities following armed clashes and a deteriorating situation in Sortony, North Darfur.

- **Syria Cross-border HF: \$50 million** to address critical lifesaving needs of IDPs and other vulnerable people in underserved areas and deliver vital assistance such as shelter, water, food and fuel, to help households during the winter period. This allocation was made in complementarity with the CERF-allocation from the Underfunded Emergency window and will prioritize approaches that encourage early-recovery and resilience.
- **Yemen HF: \$45 million** to ensure that life-saving services for IDPs and nearby communities are available, including mine clearance. It will prioritize innovative programming that promotes sustainable and localized solutions. **\$3 million** for a single project that will support the Rapid Response Mechanism, and that will enable procurement, transportation and distribution of basic hygiene kits, immediate ready rations and transit kits.

Thirteen new allocation rounds were launched in December:

- **DRC HF: \$16.5 million** to respond to food insecurity by contributing to a multi-sectoral response that preserves livelihoods and reduces vulnerabilities. The allocation will use cash assistance and include protection of children and respond to gender-based violence. **\$4 million** to provide emergency and protection assistance to (newly) displaced people and food security in regions that have unstable access to food. **\$1 million** to support logistics and infrastructure rehabilitation in Fizi in the Province of South Kivu to facilitate humanitarian access to the most affected populations in areas where the humanitarian response is limited by physical constraints or because of violent attacks.
- **Ethiopia HF: \$24.3 million** to support the safe and dignified return or relocation along with other drought-focused response in health and nutrition, placing protection at the center of the response. The allocation also includes seed funding for accountability to affected people, protection against sexual exploitation and abuse, and gender. Noting the volatile context and access constraints, this allocation will prioritize partnership and strong collaboration with national NGOs.
- **Nigeria HF: \$1.5 million** as part of the Durable Solutions' project which seeks durable solutions for long-term IDPs. The allocation will center around displaced people and is driven by the intentions and wishes of the displaced, gauged by intention surveys. The approach will be iterative and incremental until the conditions are conducive for large-scale returns. The project will seek to promote durable solutions where there are opportunities, defined by security and resources available.

- **oPt HF: \$5.0 million** to respond to ongoing humanitarian needs by supporting livelihoods and strengthening access to basic services.
- **Somalia HF: \$0.4 million** to support the Somalia NGO Consortium to strengthen coordination and coherence of aid interventions; increase inclusion of the most vulnerable people in humanitarian action; facilitate dialogue with local authorities to address bureaucratic impediments for better access; and develop capacities of NGOs to provide efficient humanitarian assistance.
- **Sudan HF: \$3.9 million** to anticipate the impact on food security and livelihoods of less than usual rainfall and reduced ground water for agriculture and drinking water for the population and livestock in several regions. It will focus on animal health, water supply and malnutrition. **\$0.8 million** to respond to the sharp increase in COVID-19 cases and overflowing isolation centers by covering operational costs of isolation centers, case management, infection and prevention control (IPC), oxygen, medical supplies, PPE, and training of medical staff in under resourced areas.
- **Syria HF: \$3 million** to address acute emergency needs in health facilities through procurement of life-saving medicines and vital medical supplies including ventilators, equipping COVID-19 case management centers and strengthening diagnostic capacity of national laboratories. **\$1 million** to ensure continuation of the United Nations Humanitarian Air Services (UNHAS) in Syria as the disruption of UNHAS services, even if only temporary, puts millions of people at risk of not receiving essential humanitarian assistance.
- **Yemen HF: \$3.5 million** to support community-based, primary and secondary healthcare, education programmes, protection (including GBV and child protection), rehabilitation of water supply and sanitation systems, and hygiene kits for the most vulnerable people in the Al Baydah Governorate and the Al Abdia District. Additionally, in the Al Hudaydah Governorate, the allocation provides critical support to mine action as an enabling service for humanitarian action. **\$2 million** for Humanitarian Air Services (UNHAS) transporting humanitarian workers in and out of Yemen, as well as light cargo and carrying out medical or security evacuations.
