

SOMALIA TASK FORCE ON YEMEN SITUATION

INTER-AGENCY UPDATE #12

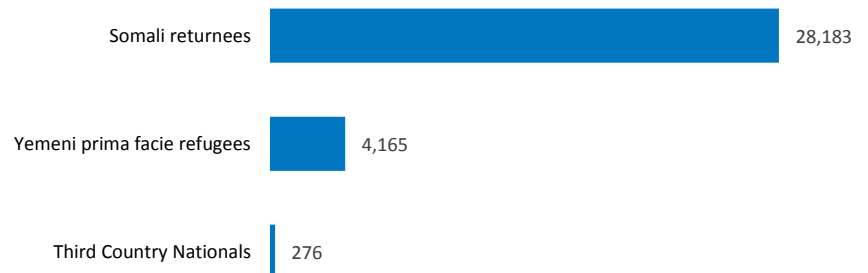
16 June – 30 June 2016

HIGHLIGHTS

- During the reporting period, there have been six boat arrivals from Yemen to Somalia, two in Puntland (13 Yemeni, 58 Somali and 1 Tanzanian), four in Somaliland, (41 arrivals in Somaliland; 33 Yemenis, 7 Somali and 1 Sudanese), carrying a total of 113 individuals.
- All new arrivals that went to the Bossaso reception center were registered by UNHCR in collaboration with local authorities and partners.

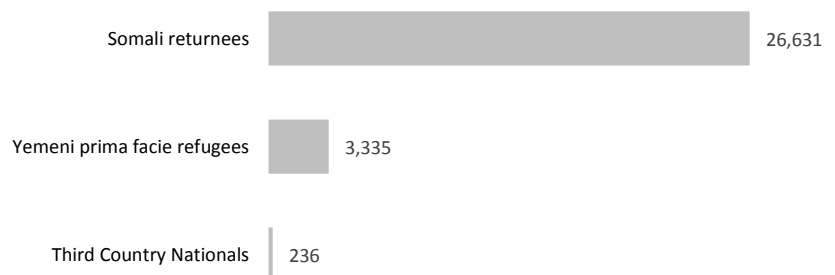
Population of concern

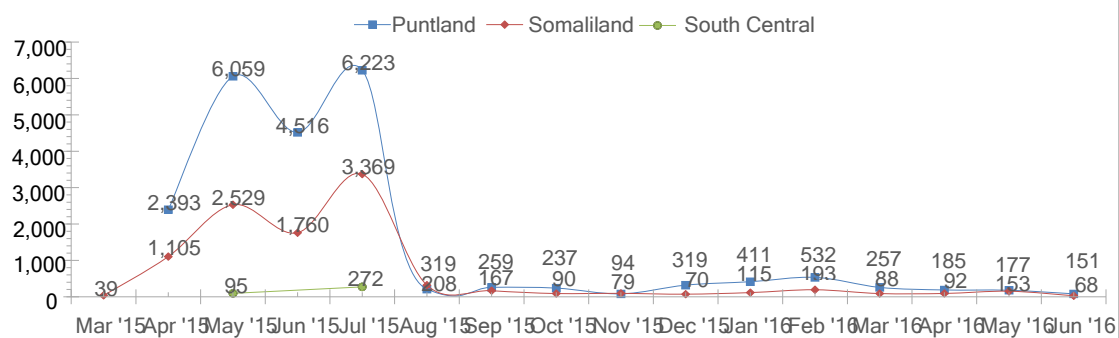
Requested for the **Somalia Response Plan for Yemen Crisis (January-December 2016)**

UPDATE ON ACHIEVEMENTS

Operational Context

PUNTLAND

- Yemen arrivals to the port of Bosasso has drastically decreased for the past three weeks, some residents believe it's due to the holy month of Ramadan that the people have minimized their movements.

SOMALILAND

- Since March 2015, 10,261 new arrivals (3,527 families) have been recorded in Somaliland, including 2,131 Yemenis, 7,977 Somalis, 116 Ethiopians and 26 people of other nationalities. During the last two weeks of June, only three boats from Yemen arrived in Berbera with 36 new arrivals.

Achievements



PUNTLAND

- During reporting period two boats arrived at the port of Bossaso with the above new arrivals. They were assisted with refreshments and biscuits provided by DRC, transport from the port to the Reception Centre was provided by IOM and biometric registration for all arrivals at the Reception Centre was undertaken by UNHCR.
- Reinstallation grant was provided to those who opted to stay in Bossaso to UNHCR 17HHs (83 individuals).
- UNHCR FO Bossaso is providing subsistence allowance for three months for all Yemeni arrivals, followed by a vulnerability assessment to determine future needs. The results of the assessment 229 households scored as severely vulnerable, 75 cases highly vulnerable, 14 cases border vulnerable and 2 cases scored low level of vulnerable. A comprehensive report will be shared soon.

SOMALILAND

- During the reporting period, a total of 36 individuals arrived in Somalia from Yemen through the port of Berbera (28 Yemeni refugees, 7 Somali returnees and one Sudanese asylum seeker). The boats arrived on 20, 25, and 29 June. The new arrivals paid 100 USD for the crossing and did not report any cases of armed, physical violence or GBV during their journey.
- Reception services were provided by DRC (Danish Refugee Council), UNHCR and Somali Red Crescent Society (SRCS) teams. Entry formalities were duly conducted by Government agencies and the Immigration office operating at the sea-port of entry. There were no undocumented foreigners among the newly disembarked group. All persons were found to be in good health and, after provision of food and water, were accommodated in the Reception Centre.
- Basic needs -including water, food and emergency health care facilities- have been made available for the new arrivals at the Centre. UNHCR's partner, Comprehensive Community Based Rehabilitation in Somaliland (CCBR) conducted vulnerability assessments for the provision of Onward Transportation Allowance (OTA) by IOM. Most new arrivals reported that the ongoing war in Yemen had forced them to leave their country and that transportation between towns and cities inside Yemen is very difficult, if not altogether impossible in some provinces. All people of concern were provided by DRC with non-food item (NFI) kits, water and accommodation at the Reception Centre.

Health

PUNTLAND

- Yemeni refugees continue to receive medical assistance through UNHCR's Implementing partner Gruppo per le Relazioni Transculturali (GRT) during biometric registration, in case of medical emergency, and after registration in all other cases.
- 42 received primary health care, 81 received secondary tertiary and 48 underwent lab examinations.

SOMALILAND

- On 20 June, one Yemeni arrival suffered chest pain and was referred to IOM clinic at the Berbera Reception center where he had received medication and continued to his final destination.

Food Security and Nutrition

PUNTLAND

- The Puntland Students Association, contracted by WFP, provided cooked meals to all new arrivals at the Reception Centre in Bossaso for period of five days, consisting of three cooked meals daily.

SOMALILAND

- DRC, in collaboration with WFP, provided cooked meals to all new arrivals.

Water and Sanitation

PUNTLAND

- Water, both drinking and for other uses, is provided at the Reception Centre in Bossaso. Sanitation is provided by UNHCR through staff hired by the Ministry of the Interior.

Shelter and NFIs

PUNTLAND

- New arrivals from Yemen were provided with 195 non-food item kits (NFIs).

SOMALILAND

- During the reporting period, 8 new arrivals were provided with core relief item (CRI) kits. Since the beginning of the Yemeni crisis, 953 CRI kits have been distributed to vulnerable new arrivals.

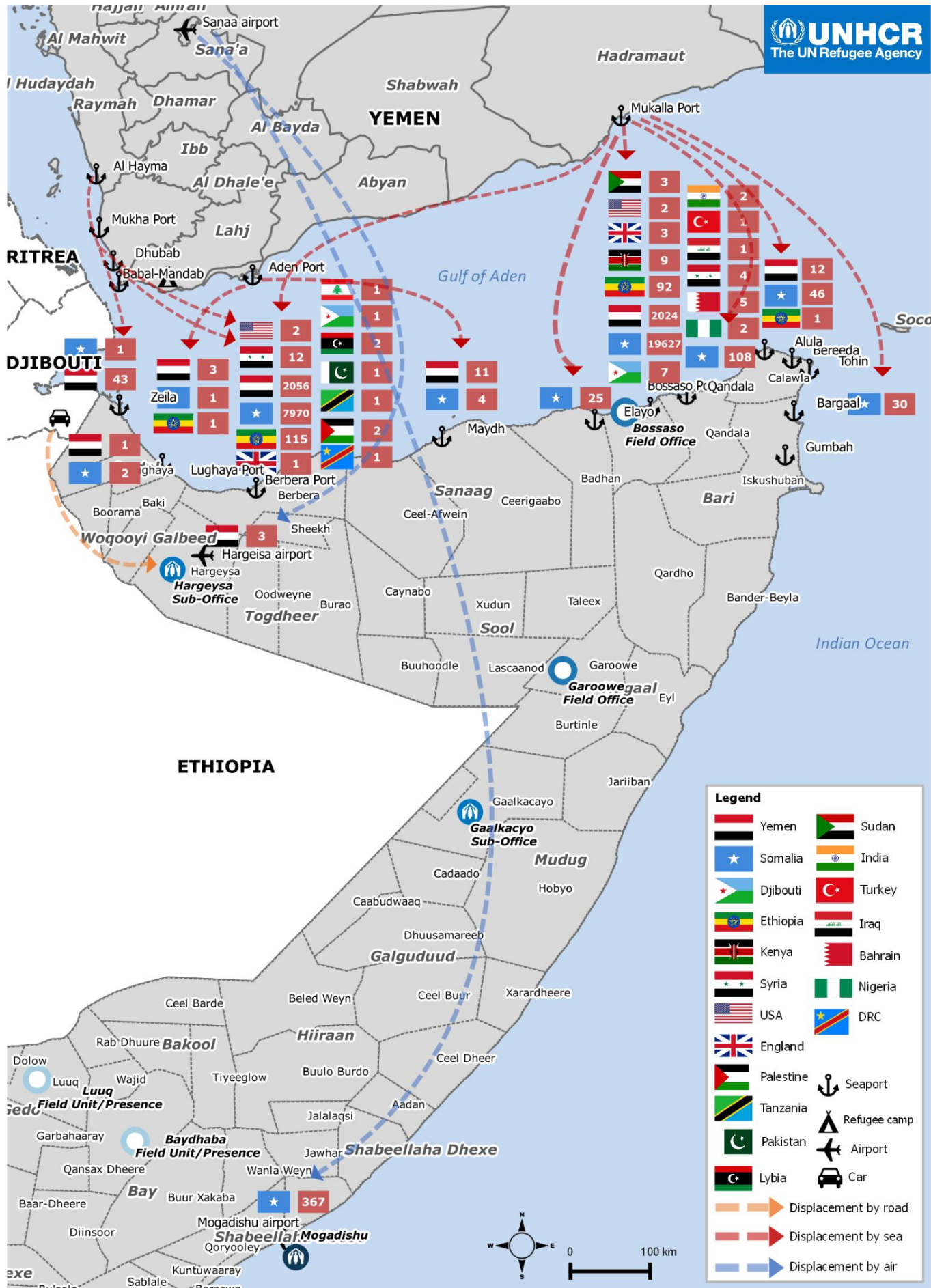
Logistics

PUNTLAND

- During the reporting period, 28 Somali returnees from South and Central Somalia were provided with Onward Transport Assistance (OTA) to enable them to reach their places of origin in a safe and dignified manner.

SOMALILAND

- Among the 27 individuals who disembarked on 20th and 25th of June, 8 new arrivals were provided with Onward Transport Assistance (OTA) to enable them to reach their places of origin in a safe and dignified manner.

FINANCIAL INFORMATION

The Somalia Response Plan for Yemen Crisis (April – December 2015) was released on 4 June and shared with donors, governments and partners. 11 UN agencies and NGOs participate in the inter-agency response.
