







SITUATION OVERVIEW

From January to October 2016, national and international humanitarian partners have reached more than 5 million people with direct humanitarian assistance across Yemen's 22 governorates. This has been accomplished despite the access constraints that continue to be imposed by the parties to the conflict.

The cholera outbreak, declared in early October, is affecting 15 governorates; humanitarians are responding with health, water, and sanitation interventions to treat and contain the spread of the disease.

The 2016 Humanitarian Response Plan has received 57 per cent funding against the 1.6 billion appeal to date.



FOOD SECURITY AND AGRICULTURE*

Improve immediate household availability of and access to food for the most vulnerable people in Yemen.

Needs

Approximately 51 per cent of the population (14 million Yemenis) are food insecure with 7 million severely food insecure. The food insecurity is expected to further deteriorate due to conflict-induced scarcity of basic commodities, disruption of markets, high prices of essential commodities, and dwindling livelihoods & income opportunities.

Response

An average of 3.8 million people per month were reached with regular emergency food assistance in September and October 2016, while over 387,000 people have received emergency livelihoods assistance during the January to October period. The current liquidity crisis and bureaucratic impediments to cash are greatly hampering partners' cash and/or voucher activities.

HEALTH

Provide comprehensive, essential and life-saving healthcare services to affected and vulnerable populations; reinforce health system and strengthen resilience, livelihoods, and early recovery activities.

Needs

The Acute Watery Diarrhoea (AWD)/cholera outbreak declared in October, affecting 15 governorates, has put further strains on the fragile health system. The communicable disease surveillance and response mechanism is stretched to its limit, while humanitarian partners work in support of the Ministry of Health to contain the outbreak.

Response

A joint Health/WASH intervention package to isolate the AWD/cholera outbreak has been developed and is currently under implementation. Essential health services provided through mobile and fixed teams continue.

Deliver quality lifesaving nutrition services for children under 5 and pregnant and lactating women through Community-Based Management of Acute Malnutrition (CMAM) and Infant and Young Child Feeding (IYCF) services as well as prevent malnutrition through provision of micronutrient, and blanket supplementary feeding for children under 2.

Needs

Nearly 3 million people (74 per cent children under 5 and 26 per cent pregnant and lactating women) require humanitarian nutrition assistance. Almost 1.3 million children are acutely malnourished.

Response

To date, the response has reached 934,512 children under 5 and pregnant and lactating women through provision of micronutrient, and blanket supplementary feeding for children under 2 years of age.

Provide adequate shelter for displaced persons in liveable and dignified settings.

Needs

Varying lengths of displacement have impacted housing market availability, rental costs and host community saturation capacity. Out of 3.3 million people that have moved since March 2015 in search of safety, security and livelihoods the majority of IDPs (55 per cent) are currently residing with host families, whilst 22 per cent are accommodated in rented property, and 19 per cent have sought refuge in collective centres or spontaneous settlements. Returnees often return to houses partially damaged or completely destroyed.

Response

During September and October NFIs were distributed to 11,039 households and emergency shelters kits to 5,282 households across 12 governorates. Some 788 households were assisted with cash support for rental subsidies in 4 governorates. Since the beginning of the year over 500,000 have been reached with NFIs and over 185,000 with emergency shelter kits.

Address the education concerns of populations affected by humanitarian crises in a predictable and well-coordinated manner.

Needs

Instability continues to threaten children's return to school. There is an urgent need for learning supplies and textbooks, temporary learning spaces, and rehabilitation of conflict affected schools to support students return to schools. Also psychosocial support for students is needed.

Response

During September and October, many conflict affected schools have been rehabilitated in different governorates, including with WASH facilities, helping 47,366 students. The provision and distribution of school bags and textbooks in 16 governorates, benefited 148,299 students. Some 4,321 school desks have been provided or repaired, targeting 12,963 students, and psychosocial support training has been conducted for teachers.

Provision of immediate life-saving services and direct protection assistance to migrants and refugees.

Needs

Migrants and refugees are in need of immediate assistance such as food, WASH, health, temporary shelter, and protection. In January to October, 105,971 migrants, asylum seekers and refugees were estimated to have newly arrived in Yemen, crossing the Red and Arabian Seas.

Response

Partners provided a range of humanitarian assistance to refugees and migrants. The response for migrants included identifying vulnerabilities and providing immediate assistance to unaccompanied minors, GBV cases, and victims of human rights violations. The response for refugees also included distribution of food, water, NFIs, shelter, health, and protection.



Logistics support to emergency supply of fuel, storage, road, sea and air transport assistance.

Needs

Humanitarian organisations responding to the crisis in Yemen face a number of specific challenges that impede their ability to deliver relief items, such as: limited access to some of the conflict areas; inadequate or damaged infrastructure; congestion at main entry points; unreliable and unpredictable access to fuel and high volatility in its price; bureaucratic process and limited international shipping options, both by sea and air.

Response

In response to the needs, the Logistics Cluster supports the humanitarian community to facilitate, coordinate, and ensure effective and efficient delivery of life-saving relief items to affected populations in Yemen, through: coordination and information management; and, access to transport (overland, sea and air), fuel provision and storage. Additionally, the Logistics Cluster facilitates a sea passenger's service between Djibouti and Aden (414 passengers transported in 2016).

Support the repair and maintenance of affected WASH systems, and direct provision of WASH services and items to affected people.

Needs

A cholera outbreak was declared in the first week of October. There is a strong correlation with this outbreak and the deteriorating water, sanitation and hygiene conditions in the country. The outbreak continues to increase in scale and scope. To contain the outbreak and to prevent new districts affected, it is critical to increase the support to the WASH cluster to be able to respond.

Response

WASH partners responded to contain the cholera outbreak with immediate chlorination of water sources and distribution of chlorine tablets and soap for affected and at risk households. Water trucking was also increased to ensure provision of safe water, and problems with overflowing sewage were addressed. However, there are still gaps in the response. Preventative actions continued in other areas.

Monitoring & assistance to persons with specific needs; multi-sectoral GBV response services; monitoring of grave child rights violations; life-saving services for conflict-affected children.

Needs

The protection needs/risks include: civilian death or injury; freedom of movement; civil status documents; psychological trauma; inability to meet basic needs; inadequate info on humanitarian assistance; GBV i.e. sexual & domestic violence, forced marriages, denial of resources, psychological abuse; grave child rights violations i.e. children killed or maimed, exposure to landmines, recruitment & use of children as soldiers, attacks against schools & hospitals; separation from families, child trafficking & psychological distress.

Response

Protection & human rights/IHL monitoring; support to CBPNs; psychosocial, legal & financial assistance; sensitization and capacity building activities. GBV response: psychosocial support; medical & legal assistance; emergency shelter and livelihood support; dignity kits & GBV awareness raising. CP response: monitoring of grave violations of child rights; psychosocial support; mine risk education; family tracing and reunification; victim assistance and rehabilitation support for injured children.

Protect communities from the threat of mines and Unexploded Ordnance (UXO), reduce risks rising from undisposed waste and strengthen local economies and infrastructure.

Needs

New landmine/UXO contamination is registered in more than 15 governorates, some of which at critical level. Households' access to savings has halved and access to social welfare benefits decreased by two-thirds compared to pre-escalation of conflict levels.


Response

Mine/UXO clearance is ongoing in 11 governorates, with over 22,000 Explosive Remnants of War (ERWs) recovered and defused and 3,086 victims of Mines and other ERWs assisted in their recovery. In September to October more than 2,500 families directly benefited from rural resilience activities. Since the beginning of the year over 9,800 individuals have been employed in cash for work interventions focusing on community infrastructure and close to 8,000 micro-businesses have been supported. Over 1 million people are benefiting from emergency cleaning campaigns, clearing over 23,000 tons of accumulated waste hazardous to health, in 10 governorates.

EMERGENCY TELECOMMUNICATIONS

Provide life-saving telecommunications, data services and power charging stations to support humanitarian action and increase staff safety.

Needs

The affected population is the entire response community. The need for internet services in operational hubs and on the inter-agency mission boat remains. Reliable security telecommunication services are required by humanitarians to carry out their activities on the ground in a safe way.

Response

Back-up connectivity has been established in Ibb hub for the NGO community at ACTED premises. An assessment was conducted at the Diplomatic Transit Facility (DTF) to enhance the internet services that the ETC is providing. ICT equipment was received in Aden where security telecommunications services will be strengthened.
