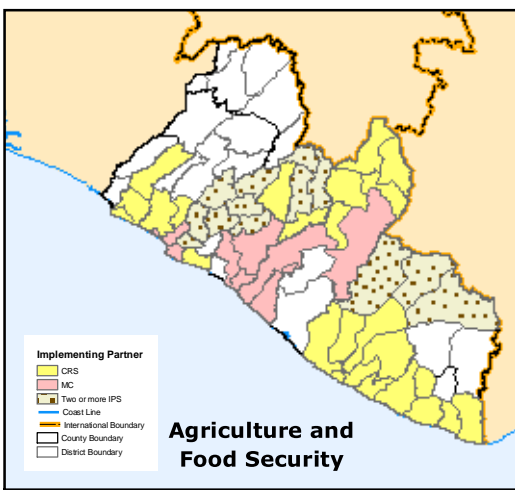
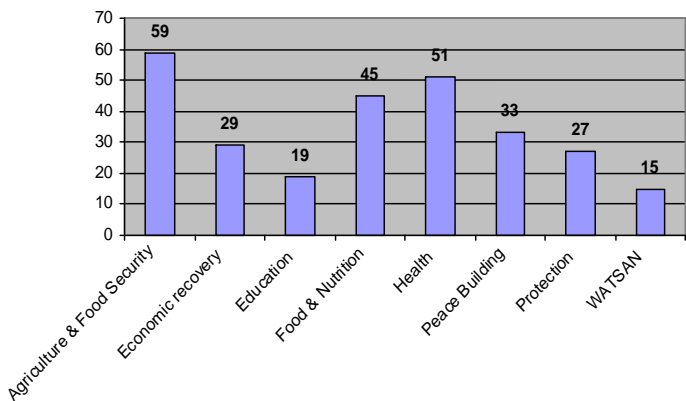


# U.S. Government Funded Humanitarian and Transitional Activity by District (2005)
