

## I. HIGHLIGHTS/KEY PRIORITIES

- Revision of the Flash Appeal has been finalised at a local level. Activities are planned under the Flash Appeal until the end of December 2009, beyond which humanitarian activities will be incorporated in the 2010 Yemen Humanitarian Response Plan (YHRP).
- The draft 2010 YHRP is under review at headquarters level. The overall aim of the YHRP is to respond to critical humanitarian needs which have been triggered, or in some cases exacerbated, by civil conflict. It will also address issues affecting the whole country, including child malnutrition and food security, the impact of refugees arriving from the Horn of Africa, and the Early Recovery response to the 2008 flooding in Hadramout. The YHRP will be made public as part of the global launch of the Consolidated Appeals Process (CAP) on 2 December 2009.
- Lack of access to some conflict-affected areas continues to hamper provision of humanitarian assistance. The supply route to Sa'ada town was closed for nearly three weeks in October, blocking twelve trucks with relief items. Although the route was reopened on 31 October, the situation remains unpredictable. The potential for using an alternative side road to provide assistance is being explored.

## II. Background

The security situation in Sa'ada and neighbouring governorates continues to deteriorate, causing increased movement of displaced people. The situation for IDPs is becoming increasingly challenging as the winter season approaches and regular operational obstructions continue to delay the overall provision of humanitarian assistance. However, a United Nations cross-border assessment, facilitated by the Governments of Yemen and the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia, took place in northern Sa'ada (Al-Mandaba, Alb) on 26-29 October, where it is estimated that 8,000-10,000 people are sheltered, with 140-210 people arriving daily. Additionally, the Yemeni authorities have allowed the provision of humanitarian assistance to IDPs in host communities in Amran Governorate, after initial suspension of aid. The table below shows the number of IDPs registered by humanitarian actors as of 31 October 2009:

### III. Yemen Flash Appeal

Revision of the Yemen Flash Appeal has been finalised at a local level, in coordination with the Yemeni Government. It includes an update of the needs of each Cluster, with slight substantive and financial revisions, as the humanitarian needs and trajectory of the crisis have become clearer.

Although there is a good overview of donations committed to the Flash Appeal, it is clear that considerable assistance has been provided outside the framework of the Flash Appeal, such as bilateral assistance given to the Government of Yemen. These contributions are clearly needed and welcomed, but there is an urgent need to comprehensively record them. An accurate and real-time overview of all assistance provided will facilitate a coordinated and cost-efficient response among all actors so as to fill gaps and avoid overlaps. Therefore, all donors and recipients of funding and in-kind contributions, whether they are contributions within the framework of the Flash Appeal or outside it, are requested to report all donations to FTS, either by e-mail to [fts@reliefweb.int](mailto:fts@reliefweb.int), or by fax to +41 22 917 0368 or + 41 22 917 0022, addressed to *FTS, CAP Section*.

Japan has decided to allocate US\$1.92 million to the Flash Appeal to UNHCR, WFP and WHO. Additionally, ECHO allocations amounting to US\$1.5 million are likely to be confirmed shortly, once related Aid Decision has been approved in Brussels.
