

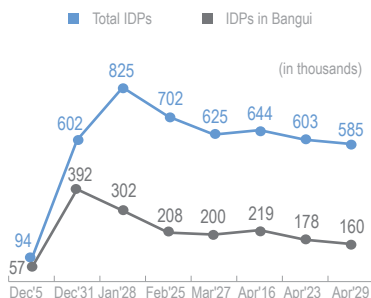
The security situation remains extremely volatile and unpredictable throughout the country. Ongoing violence and attacks against civilians, especially Muslim communities in Bangui, are causing population displacements into neighbouring Chad, Cameroon, Republic of Congo and the DRC. Humanitarian operations continue to be constrained by severe funding gaps, active fighting and attacks on the population, aid workers and assets. The number of IDPs has decreased by 58,000 over the past week in Bangui.

### Internally Displaced Persons (as of 29 April)

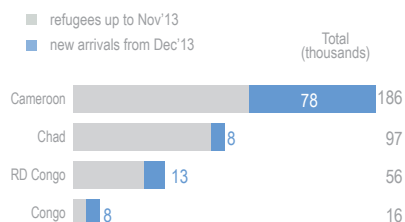
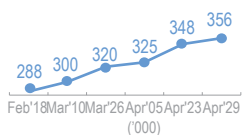

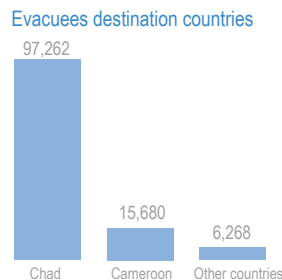

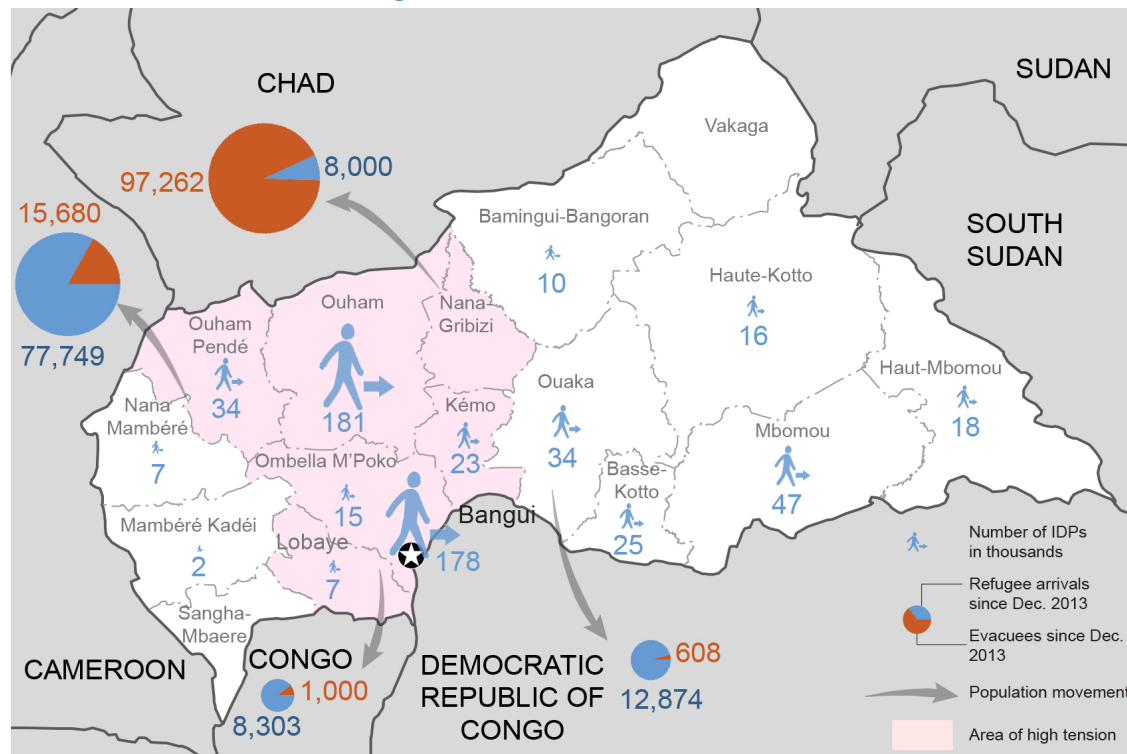

## Total IDPs, Refugees and Evacuees since December 2013



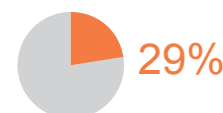
## FUNDING (US\$)

Funding continues to be insufficient to meet growing needs. CCCM, Education and Emergency Telecommunications sectors have not received any funding despite high needs at IDP sites, children out of school since December, and the lack of communication infrastructure.
