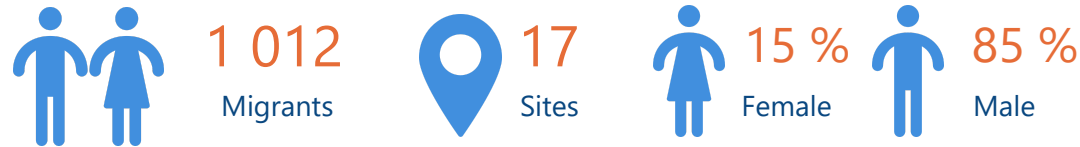


STRANDED MIGRANTS IN DJIBOUTI AS OF 17 SEPTEMBER 2020



Following the border closure in Ethiopia and due to the stricter border management policies in Yemen, some of the migrants who were transiting through Djibouti on their way to or from the Arabian Peninsula found themselves stranded in the country. These migrants live in spontaneous sites located along the migration corridor.

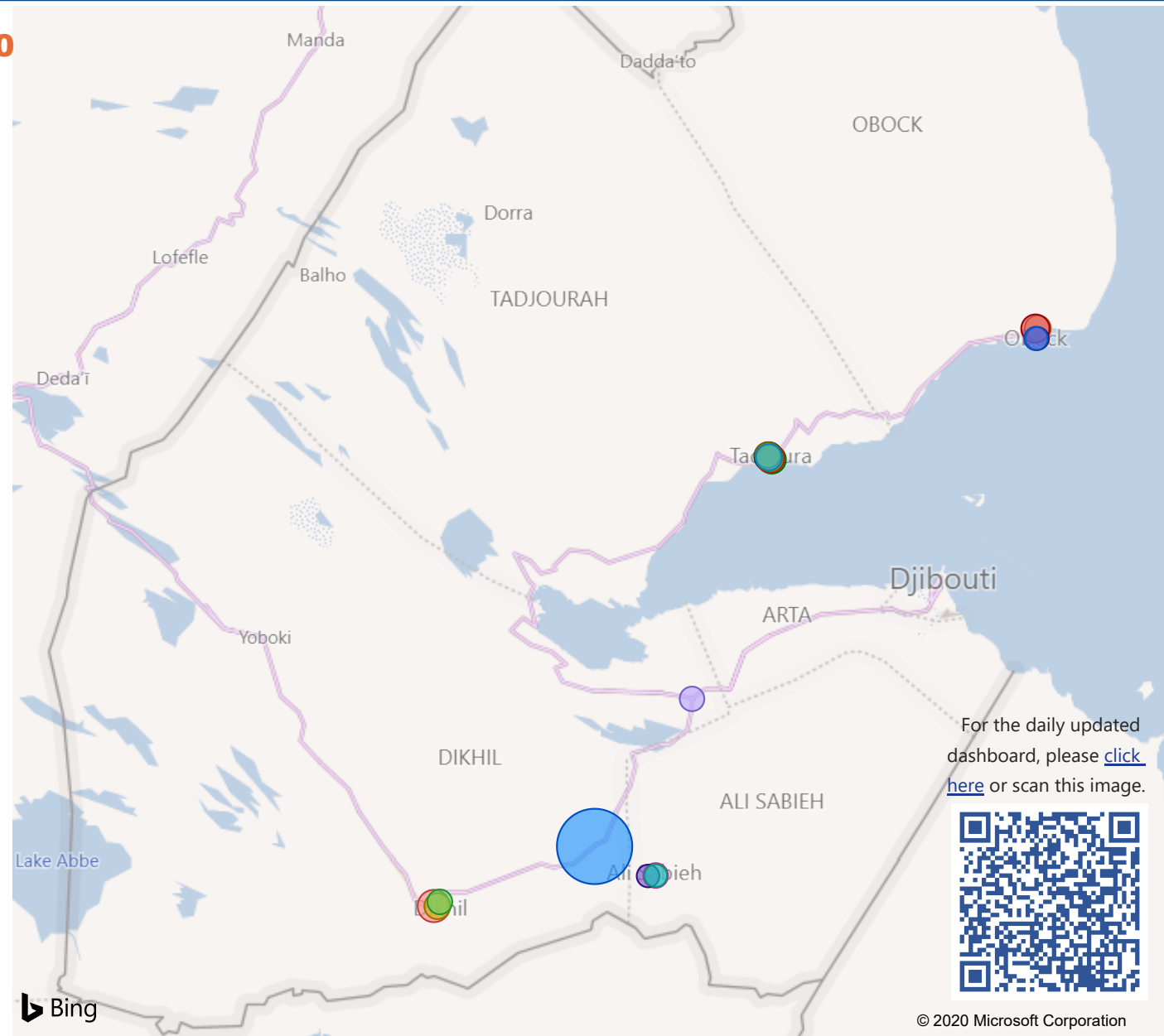
The Displacement Tracking Matrix (DTM), through its field enumerator teams and key informants, collects data on a daily basis at migrant sites across the country.

All reported migrants are Ethiopian nationals.

NOTE: This data does not include Djibouti City. The estimation of the distribution of migrants by sex is based on the data collected since April 2020.

IMMEDIATE NEEDS: Water, food, hygiene kits, non food items (NFI)

RETURNS FROM YEMEN BETWEEN 1 AND 17 SEPTEMBER 2020



Since the beginning of this month, 349 migrants from Yemen (102 female and 247 male) arrived at Obock coast, mainly between Moulhoule and Ras Bir. Since May 2020, a total of 2,500 migrants (450 female and 2,050 male) have returned from Yemen.
