

DSWD DROMIC Report #68 on the Taal Volcano Eruption as of 11 March 2020, 6PM

Situation Overview

At 5:30 PM, 12 January 2020, the Philippine Institute of Volcanology and Seismology (PHIVOLCS) has raised alert level 4 over Taal Volcano, indicating that hazardous eruption is possible within hours to days. In its 8:00 AM, 14 February 2020 advisory, the agency has lowered the alert status of Taal Volcano from **Alert Level 3** to **Alert Level 2** (decreased unrest), recommending that entry into Taal Volcano Island (TVI), Taal's Permanent Danger Zone must be strictly prohibited.


