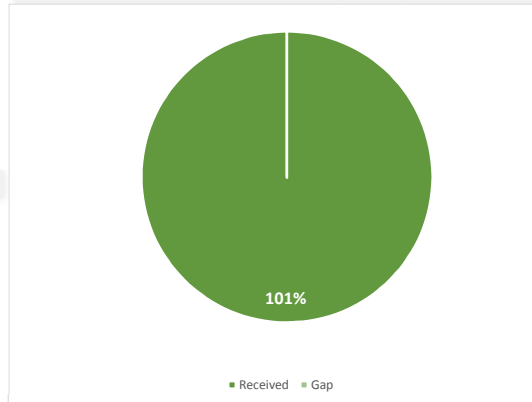

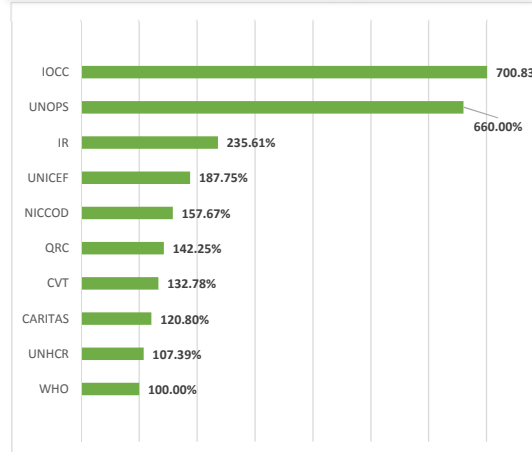
% of funds received vs total requested (by Sector)
