

UNICEF Biweekly Situation Report No.42- Liberia
24 October 2011

Reporting Period: 1-24 October 2011



A Child Friendly Space supported by UNICEF at Solo Camp for Ivorian refugees in Grand Gedeh County of western Liberia.
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Highlights

- **The total number of Ivorian refugees in Liberia stands at 159,489.**
- **A total of 10,704 children (5,870 boys and 4,870 girls)** are currently benefiting from the child friendly services supported by UNICEF at all refugee-affected counties.
- 2,102 children under five years were screened for acute malnutrition during the two previous weeks. **14.6 per cent of all the children screened had moderate to severe acute malnutrition.**
- **Over 35,000** Ivorian children are accessing Primary Education, Early Childhood Development (ECD) and vocational skills training services supported by UNICEF and partners in all counties affected by the Cote d'Ivoire refugee crisis.
- Poor road conditions and election campaigns have slowed down humanitarian activities in all refugee-affected counties.
- **Malaria** continues to be the leading causes of morbidity among the general population and children under five in the emergency-affected areas.
- **Over 35,000 Ivorian children are accessing primary education and Early Childhood Development** services supported by UNICEF and partners in Nimba, Grand Gedeh and Maryland counties.
- **UNICEF continues to have unmet funding needs of \$18 million.**
- The National elections were peacefully conducted and were commended by national and international observers. After ballots count, none of the contestant candidates passed the 50 per cent threshold needed for outright victory. **A run-off has been set for 8 November.**
- The overall security situation in Liberia remains calm.

This situation report is produced regularly for UNICEF headquarters in New York in addition to contributions submitted for the 'One UN' Weekly Refugee Humanitarian Response update.

Situation Overview

- The total number of refugees in Liberia currently stands at 159,489 with 66,684 in Grand Gedeh, 44,838 in Nimba, 36,061 in Maryland, 11,530 in River Gee and 376 in Montserrado.
- ICRC reported 75 spontaneous cross-border family reunification of refugee separated children and unaccompanied minors, 8 increase from two weeks ago.
- 1,887 children were immunized for different antigens with 422 children immunized against measles in response to the six suspected cases reported from Grand Gedeh and Maryland counties respectively.
- The Norwegian Refugee Council (NRC) completed the recording of 80 new births at the Bahn camp entering all new births on the Ministry of Health's Paternity and Delayed Birth Registration Forms.
- Food: As of 17 October, WFP has completed food distribution to 51,112 refugees out of the targeted 159,113 and 3,000 out of the 100,000 vulnerable host population planned in October. In Country food stocks as of 19 September is 901 MT.
- Heavy rains continue to impact accessibility creating serious challenge and causing delays in food transportation and distribution.

Humanitarian Needs

- As part of the revised EHAP, the International community continues to have unmet humanitarian funding needs which will hamper the ability to continue to provide humanitarian assistance.
- Providing protection and assistance to refugees to reduce their vulnerability and improve their dignity remains a priority in camps and host communities.
- Continued urgent requirements for adequate safe drinking water, sanitation, food, nutrition and primary health care services. There is a high risk of water-borne and sanitation related diseases and epidemics during this season.
- Clothes, blankets and mosquito nets are urgently required for immediate distribution to children and women.
- The bad condition of roads and bridges is a constant challenge for humanitarian workers in transporting of supplies and providing much needed services in both camps and host communities.

UNICEF Response

UNICEF, in collaboration with partners, has developed strategic sector plans considering the different programmatic environments in four counties.

PROGRAMMATIC INTERVENTIONS

Health

- Micro planning and training are on-going at all counties for a nationwide measles campaign including emergency counties is scheduled to take place on 25 November to 1 December. The campaign targets 577,030 children. Mebendazole and Vitamin A supplementation will be administered to children aged 6-59 months during the campaign.
- Planning for the distribution of 1,152 baby kits is underway between UNICEF, IRD and MoH. The kit contains a basin, soap, quilt, blanket, clothing and diapers to mothers delivering in refugee camps in Nimba, Grand Gedeh and Maryland.

Nimba

- MSF operated 4 mobile clinics during the last week receiving a total of 245 patients, 46% of which were refugees.
- 103 confirmed cases of malaria were treated (48% of total consultation for new cases). Malaria remains the top cause of morbidity. 44 of the malaria cases are under the age of 5 years (65% of all under five consultations). The reported malaria cases are in constant.
- 367 patients visited MSF facilities in Bahn camp.
- 78 cases of confirmed malaria were detected, representing 24% of the total consultations. Malaria remains the top morbidity. 41 of the malaria cases are under the age of 5 years (47% of all under five consultations).
- UNICEF supported the community malaria education project with partner Mentor Initiative in 3 refugee affected communities in Nimba. Supplies are procured and a baseline evaluation is being done before specific education activities begin next week.

Grand Gedeh

- A total of 1,307 consultations conducted through 6 facilities during the reporting period. Of these 377 (28.8%) were refugees and 930 (71.3%) Liberians.
- Malaria was the leading cause of morbidity among the general population; accounting for 506 cases (38.7%) followed by ARI 223 cases (17.1%), STI 83 cases (6.4%), malnutrition 33 cases (2.5%) and diarrhoeal diseases 12 cases (0.9%).
- A total of 460 consultations were recorded for children under 5 years of age, accounting for 35.2% of the total consultations.
- The leading cause of morbidity in this age group was Malaria accounting for 53.5% (246 cases), ARI 21.7% (100 cases), Malnutrition 33 cases (7.2%) and 7 cases of Diarrhoeal diseases accounting for 1.5% of under five years old consultations.
- One case of suspected measles was reported in Janzon clinic in a Liberian child under the age of 5 years. There were also 2 cases of bloody diarrhoea reported in the area. Both children, a refugee and a Liberian, are above 5 years.
- UNICEF conducted training for 22 vaccinators and District Health Officers in Grand Gedeh. The training included vaccine management, storage temperature, VVM, vaccine use, shelf life, vaccine records as well as maintenance of solar refrigerators.

Maryland

- The Maryland Health Education Project is on-going. The CHT in cooperation with UNICEF and Tubman University is analyzing baseline evaluation results and preparing to train 54 Health Facility OICs, Community Health Focal Persons and DHO's in Harper.
- The UNICEF cold-chain team carried out training for 21 health workers in Maryland on vaccine management, equipment maintenance and reporting procedures. Maryland CHT is facilitating the training for key persons with assistance from UNICEF.

River Gee


- The River Gee CHT in collaboration with UNICEF, MoH Family Health and NACP, is currently conducting training for 25 health workers (OICs, RN's, CM's and PA's) in River Gee. The training covers PMTCT and paediatric HIV care guidelines. This intervention aims at scaling up service provision, thus increasing access.

WASH

- UNICEF continues to provide support to County CHTs and other partners on water quality monitoring and promotion of household water treatment at community and camp settings.
- UNICEF continues to provide technical and materials support for the various activities of the Global Hand Washing Day.

Nimba

- The WASH team is working on new PCA for CIPORD to implement WASH activities in 10 communities based on field monitoring and gap analysis. Meanwhile, UNICEF has supported activities in 42 host communities through 4 WASH implementing partners. Gaps still exist in the county especially in areas of sanitation reach, school WASH and strengthening operation and maintenance.



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Grand Gedeh

- UNICEF continues support to WASH implementing agencies ECREP and Solidarities International (SI) in the county. However, PCA for SI which ends on October 31st is being reviewed for possibilities of extension.
- UNICEF in collaboration with the Ministry of Public Works and the Grand Gedeh CHT are planning to conduct refresher trainings in November for WASH implementing partners. The course focuses on construction of VIP latrines and environmental management and protection.
- ECREP is currently conducting community mobilization for WASH improvements in newly identified communities.

River Gee

- UNICEF continues to provide support to NGO (DRC) implementing WASH activities in 17 communities along the River Gbeh and Ubor axis of the River Gee. The work of the NGO has been impacted by almost impassable rainy season road conditions.

Maryland

- UNICEF continues to support four NGOs (APA, ERS, PSI, & SI) implementing WASH interventions in 30 communities and 10 targeted schools. ERS continues to distribute POU products in 19 communities reaching a total of 25,778 persons in the last two weeks (18,237 host and 7,541 refugees).

Nutrition

- A total of 2,102 children under five years were screened for acute malnutrition during the two previous weeks. 27% were refugees and 73% Liberians. 25% were from Grand Gedeh, 48% were from Nimba and 27% from Maryland.
- 14.6% of all the children screened had moderate to severe acute malnutrition. The host population were more malnourished than their Ivorian counterparts, with 66% of the malnourished children being Liberians and 34% Ivoirians.
- At the Outpatient Therapeutic Feeding Centres, there were 441 children in-charge at the beginning of the first week, 132 were newly admitted, 76 were cured, 15 defaulted, no death, while 482 children are still undergoing treatment.
- At the Inpatient Therapeutic Feeding Centres, there were 6 children in-charge at the beginning of the first week, 7 was newly admitted, 5 defaulted, none died, while 8 children are still undergoing treatment.
- Around 1,227 moderately malnourished children were enrolled for supplementary feeding at the beginning of the first week, 146 new admissions, 128 cured, 8 defaulted, no death while 1,237 are still undergoing treatment.
- Due to elections in Liberia, some nutrition centres were closed for few days, explaining the decrease in screening data and OTP admissions.
- Additional four OTP centres were opened in Nimba. Trainings on management of nutrition activities were conducted for health workers within health facilities.

Nimba

- Of the 1,008 children screened, 208 (or 20.6%) had global acute malnutrition.
- 99 severely malnourished children were admitted to OTP.
- From OTP, 58 were cured and discharged, 3 defaulted, no death while 218 are still undergoing outpatient treatment.

Grand Gedeh

- Of the 525 under five children screened, 72 (or 13.7%) were moderately and severely malnourished.
- 21 severely malnourished children were admitted to OTP.
- From OTP, 18 were cured, 12 defaulted, no death, while 231 are still undergoing treatment.

Maryland

- Of the 569 children screened, 28 (or 4.9%) were malnourished.
- 12 severely malnourished children were admitted to OTP.
- From OTP, none children were cured, none defaulted, no death, while 33 are still receiving outpatient therapeutic treatment.

Education

- Over 35,000 Ivorian children are accessing Primary Education, Early Childhood Development (ECD) and vocational skills training services supported by UNICEF and partners in Nimba, Grand Gedeh and Maryland Counties.
- A delegation from the Ivorian Ministry of Education had visited Liberia between 28 September and 5 October. The team discussed with the Ministry of Education and Education Sector partners the way forward on refugee education, UNICEF and partners assisted the operational and logistical arrangements during the visit.
- Education and Child Protection joint Cluster Coordination training was organized from 28 September to 1 October in Monrovia. Participants from MOE at central, county and district levels, UNICEF partners and UNICEF Education in Emergencies and Child Protection in Emergencies officers participated in the course.

Nimba

- Over 18,200 children attended primary schools and ECD centres during the reporting period.
- Over 16,500 children (46% Ivoirians and 54% Liberians) are now in primary school with 147 teachers. Composition of Ivorian children has increased while the number of Liberian children in schools has decreased compared to the last reporting period.
- Quality of education is not satisfactory guaranteed as the percentage of trained teachers is only 56%, and the current average number of pupils per teacher is 113. UNICEF is working with partners to accelerate teacher training activities to secure the needed number of qualified teachers for primary education.
- Over 2,600 pre-primary aged children are attending ECD centres with 83 caregivers. Overall pupil-children ratio is 27 meaning one caregiver takes care of 27 children. Partners are working on the training activities for potential caregivers to meet the high need.
- Ivorian MOE delegation visited Bahn camp and several host communities in Nimba County and had dialogues with refugee children, parents and teachers. During their 3 days field mission, delegation members were impressed by the work the Liberian education sector has done so far. While critical gap was identified through the dialogues that important information about the latest situation of the Ivory Coast has not reached to the Ivorian refugees in Liberia. UNICEF and partners continue to support the joint planning between MOE Ivory Coast and MOE Liberia on behalf of Ivorian refugees to finalize the longer term strategy.
- Distribution of Ivorian primary textbooks continues in all 34 operational sites. Due to the high demand, UNICEF is reprinting the textbooks of grades 1 to 3 in order to secure adequate number of books for all children.
- In Bahn camp, UNICEF partner conducted various thematic trainings such as ECCD principles and Monitoring and Evaluation for its staffs in order to strengthen internal capacities.
- In Butuo Axis partners conducted ECD training for community members in various host communities, and distributed UNICEF's ECD manuals both English and French versions. These activities resulted in the increase of attendance in ECD centres compared to the last reporting period.
- In Loguatu Axis, 47 French teachers in the relocation and border communities attended a 3-day training on pedagogies and teaching methodologies.

- During the reporting period, More than 2,000 Liberian and Ivorian children participated in various recreational activities in Loguatu Axis areas.
- In Gborplay Axis, UNICEF partner started to organize self-study classes in Garplay, Mahdiplay and Gbeivonwea communities. In these communities, the livelihood skills training for youth has also commenced with 61 trainees and one trainer.
- 125 School-in-a-Box, 53 ECD kits, more than 6,000 learner's kits, 66 Recreational Kits have been distributed so far in Nimba.

Grand Gedeh

- Over 13,800 children attended ECD centres and primary schools. The number increased by 1,700 from the last reporting period.
- To date, 47 caregivers and 156 Ivorian primary school teachers are working in respective ECD centres and primary schools. UNICEF continues teacher training activities in all primary schools and 3 camp schools.
- In Toe Town and Janzon Axis areas, the first round of a series of training has been completed for all primary school teachers who are currently on duty.
- Over 1,600 pre-primary aged children attending ECD activities. The number shows 45% increase of attendance compared to the last reporting period.
- Over 12,200 primary aged children (73% Ivorian, 27% Liberian) have access to primary education with 156 teachers.
- To date, more than 18,000 Ivorian primary textbooks have been distributed to students of all grades. Additionally, 140 school-in-a-Box, 110 ECD Kits, more than 8,600 learner's kits, 153 Recreational Kits have been distributed so far in Grand Gedeh.
- UNICEF has been supporting a series of capacity development activities to members of the Parents and Teachers Association (PTA) on school management and community participation skills.
- UNICEF identified an increase of drop-out children both in camp schools and host community schools. Some of these cases are attributed to the movement of people in relation to the election campaigns, the relocation exercise of refugees from host communities in and around Zwedru City and Janzon communities to PTP Camp.

Maryland



- Over 2,800 children attended ECD centres and primary schools. The number is 1,500 less than that of last reporting period due to the on-going relocation exercise of refugee families and the restriction of movement during the elections period.
- To date, 9 tents (1 for Youth) erected/ 30 School-in-a-Box, 1 Recreational Kit, 4,000 learner's' Kits, over 8,000 Ivorian textbooks have been distributed through UNICEF's partner.
- UNICEF's partner has developed a training guide for 12 Ivorian facilitators in Little Wlebo Camp. The training will cover subjects of health, nutrition and the psychosocial well-being of the child.
- UNICEF partner is currently conducting a comprehensive review of all implementation sites to establish a new monitoring system. This will improve acquisition of more accurate records of the attendance of students and the performance of teachers. The new system is expected to be fully functional by the end of the month.
- Vocational skills training in computer literacy, tailoring, soap making, cooking and hairdressing has started for a total of 318 upper-primary aged Ivorian children.

River Gee

- One Liberian government school in Fishtown has started to accommodate approximately 200 Ivorian children in double shift arrangement.
- Serious challenge of accessibility of schools continues and is hampering the prepositioning of education supplies in River Gee.

Child Protection

- 54 per cent has been achieved towards the goal of reaching 20,000 children with safe learning and recreational activities. A total of 10,704 children (5,870 boys and 4,870 girls) are currently benefiting from the child friendly services supported by UNICEF at all refugee-affected counties.
- An overall of 1,459 cases of separated children and unaccompanied children have been identified among refugee population.
- 176 foster families have been identified. 151 have received training.
- UNICEF is supporting essential capacity building activities, including Safe Learning and Recreational Activities for Youth, Sexual Exploitation and Abuse (SEA) training, Gender Based Violence (GBV) training, Code of conduct training, Life skills training, Capacity-Strengthening for service providers, Prevention of Child Abuse & SEA/GBV referral pathways and Psycho-social Support Techniques
- Due to fears related to the elections, several child protection activities in the field were suspended during the reporting period due to the elections. The activities that took place had reduced attendance .



Nimba

- A total of 2,741 children have been registered (1,565 boys and 1,176 girls) in Child Friendly Centres.
- A total of 2,021 children (1,176 boys and F 845) have been registered in CFSs in Bahn camp.
- A total of 3,957 children (2,096 boys and 1,861 girls) have been registered in Child Friendly Services in Nimba's host and border communities.
- One new separated child was identified. 12 vulnerable cases and 30 cases of separated children and unaccompanied minors have been followed up on.
- SC UK followed up on 5 cases in Bahn camp.
- SC UK identified 11 new separated children and 2 unaccompanied minors and followed up on 13 cases in Nimba's host and border communities.
- A life skill training in Bahn camp for 47 children (25 boys and 22 girls).
- IRC conducted recreational activities for 1,253 refugee students (654 boys and 599 girls) in 10 relocation and boarder communities.
- A gender-based violence and code of conduct training in Zodru for a total of 91 persons (57 males and 34 females).
- A life skills training in Kparblee and Oldyourpea was conducted for 70 persons (12 males and 58 females).
- A football training/practice was conducted for 68 adults in Behwallay and for 65 children in Kaffeglay.
- SC UK reported the arrest and detention of 8 children (mostly adolescent boys) in Behwallay. The children are charged for gambling and claim to be beaten.
- SC UK reports that child labour is increasing in Kaffeglay involving parents and school authorities.

Grand Gedeh

- A total of 3,772 children (2,074 boys and 1,698 girls) have been registered in Child Friendly Spaces.
- Training on children's rights and responsibilities was conducted for 200 children in Janzon Axis.
- 135 adolescents participated in the cash for work programme.
- Two new separated children and 5 new unaccompanied minors were identified and 120 cases have been followed up on in the county.

Maryland

- Right to Play (RtP) has started a 5-day training of 30 "volunteer youth leaders" in Little Wlebo camp. Following their training the leaders will be provided with basic sport and play materials to organize

regular sport and play activities for children (6 to 12 years) within the camp. The training is monitored on a daily basis by UNICEF staff.

- UNICEF has still no partner to perform case management in the county.

River Gee

- Child Protection Working Group (CPWG) for RG held its bi-weekly meeting in Fishtown: UNICEF's new staff for RG (YC & SDD) attended the meeting for the 1st time (cf. minutes)
- CPWG for RG is conducting a mapping exercise of all CP activities in River Gee: UNICEF will compile data and make an overview
- RG team is looking into the possibility of having recreational activities for children during the weekend in some schools in RG

HIV/AIDS

- The Nimba County Health team with the technical support of UNICEF has conducted mapping of PMTCT services in Nimba County. The assessment covered 5 districts, 28 health facilities and a catchment population of 323,404. The results indicated that all health facilities are providing PMTCT services, 3,638 pregnant women were tested on HIV in the three months, 119 of which were tested HIV positive (3.3%). 93 of pregnant HIV-infected women received ARV.
- Limited number of test kits ,drugs and trained staff are major constraints facing PMTCT services in Nimba. Trained staff and test kits are urgently needed.

Communication

- A photo mission was conducted by UNICEF photographer Giacom Pirozzi at refugee affected counties.

Human Resources

- UNICEF Liberia has 39 staff currently working full time on emergency response, including staff from stand-by partner organisations (DRC, NRC, Red R Australia and CANADEM), and UNICEF international staff from Nigeria, Guinea, and Cambodia country offices.
- Liberia Country Office has 98 staff working in regular programme but many of them are engaged in the emergency response.

Funding

To date, UNICEF has received US\$ 11,944,824.17 out of its US\$ 29 million requirement as per the EHAP. As per the new funding requirements, UNICEF needs an additional 18 million to continue humanitarian assistance until December 2011 for Education, Health, WASH and Child Protection sectors.
