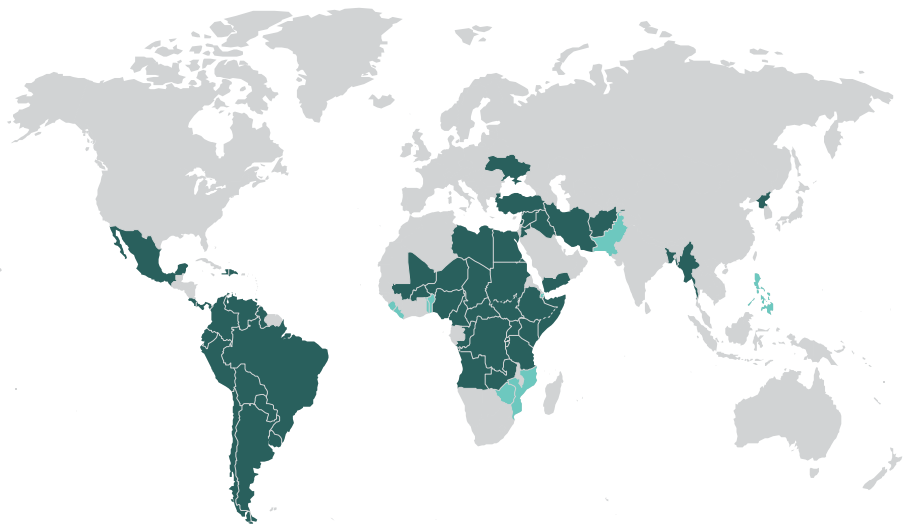

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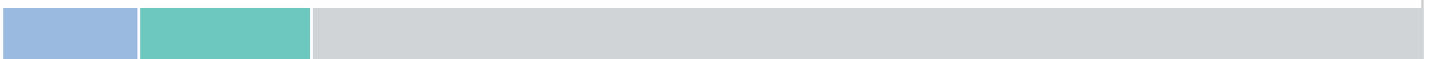
**ORGANIZATIONS PARTICIPATING IN GHRP:** UN agencies and NGO consortiums coordinated by OCHA. GHRP complements plans by the International Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement.

**PRIORITIZING:** 1) Containing the spread of the COVID-19 pandemic and decreasing morbidity and mortality; 2) Decreasing the deterioration of human assets and rights, social cohesion and livelihoods; and 3) Protecting, assisting and advocating for refugees, internally displaced people, migrants and host communities particularly vulnerable to the pandemic.

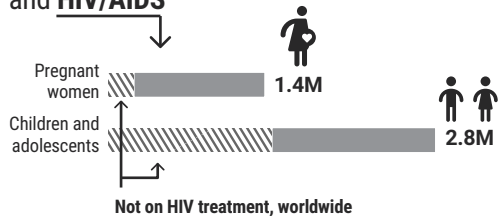

The annual GHO is published in December and updated throughout the year. The COVID-19 response is included in global humanitarian requirements.*

# CHALLENGES AND ACHIEVEMENTS

## HEALTH

### TOP RISK FACTORS

Non communicable chronic diseases such as kidney diseases, cardiovascular diseases, diabetes, tuberculosis and **HIV/AIDS**



**300 metric tons of humanitarian and medical cargo** to 89 countries. Dispatched by WFP since late January. Shipments include masks, gloves, ventilators, testing kits and thermometers.



**700,000 children and caregivers** reached with mental health and psycho-social support in 70 countries



**1,200 metric tons of test kits and other essential medical supplies** delivered by solidarity flights to 52 countries in Africa.

## FOOD

**135 million already facing acute food insecurity in 2020**



**368M children** are missing out on school meals.



**1M Palestinian refugees** in Gaza risk disruption of UNRWA food assistance.

## WASH



**8.6M people** reached with critical water, sanitation and hygiene supplies

## LOGISTICS



**80% drop** in vaccines shipments



**700 flights** expected each month for humanitarian cargo and passengers to some **120 countries**

## ECONOMY



**20% drop** in remittances  
(=30% GDP in some countries)



**-3% growth** in global GDP in 2020 (IMF)  
**↓13-32%** drop in world trade (WTO)



Poverty could rise by **500M people**



Equivalent of **305M jobs** lost

## DISPLACED PEOPLE



**80% of refugees**  
≈100% of IDPs

live in countries with **weak economic and health systems**



**167 states** closed their borders

↳ **57 of them** are not accepting people **seeking asylum**



## OLDER PEOPLE



**66%** have underlying **health conditions**



**Violence and abuse** on the rise due to lockdown and reduced care



In low-income countries only **20%** have access to a **pension** (even fewer for women)



## PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES



**80% of people with disabilities** in the world live below the poverty line (WHO)



## WOMEN



↑ **25% violence** against women



**76% unpaid care work** performed by women



**Violence** against women and girls costs an estimated **\$1.5 trillion** per year



**140 governments** support UN call to end violence against women



## CHILDREN AND ADOLESCENTS



**117M children** could miss out on measles vaccinations



**480M** with disrupted education in GHRP countries  
↳ **8M refugee children**

Ongoing desert **locust outbreak**



Recovering from **drought** and **floods** in 2019



**15M food insecure** people



**37%** of displaced children in the Horn of Africa do not have access to facilities to **wash themselves**

Affected by the **exodus** of about **5M people** from Venezuela
