

Horn of Africa – UK response to the crisis

HEADLINES

- Some 13.3 million people are affected in Djibouti, Ethiopia, Kenya and Somalia
- The first famine of the 21st Century was declared in Somalia in July 2011 with was lifted in February 2012.
- The UK is the third largest humanitarian donor to the Horn of Africa. Across the Horn UK aid is making a difference and is helping to save lives.

UK RESULTS SO FAR

Ethiopia Headline Humanitarian Results

The UK has provided emergency food aid to over 2.4 million drought-affected Ethiopians.

In addition, we are currently providing:

- Treatment for over 100,000 malnourished children and pregnant and breastfeeding mothers including fortified foods.
- Clean water and sanitation for over 420,000 people.
- Seeds and fertilizer for over 26,000 families and animal healthcare for over 9,000 families.
- Emergency shelter, water and essential items for over 125,000 Somali refugees in Ethiopia.

Somalia Headline Humanitarian Results

So far the UK has provided emergency food aid to over 250,000 drought-affected Somalis and vaccinated over 490,000 children against measles.

In addition, by the end of October we will have provided:

- Treatment for over 300,000 malnourished children including fortified foods.
- Clean water and sanitation for over 60,000 people.
- Seeds and fertiliser for over 75,000 people and animal healthcare for over 1.4 million livestock.

Overall, in the coming months, UK Aid will have helped over 1 million Somalis including:

- Providing clean water and sanitation to over 500,000 people.
- Food aid to over 750,000 people
- Measles vaccinations for over 1 million people

Kenya Headline Humanitarian Results

The UK is currently providing clean water and sanitation for over 300,000 Somali refugees in Dadaab. Britain and others are also providing emergency shelter and essential items for over 20,000 families.

In addition in the coming months;

The UK will provide emergency support to prevent and treat 500,000 malnourished children and pregnant and breastfeeding mothers across Northern Kenya.
