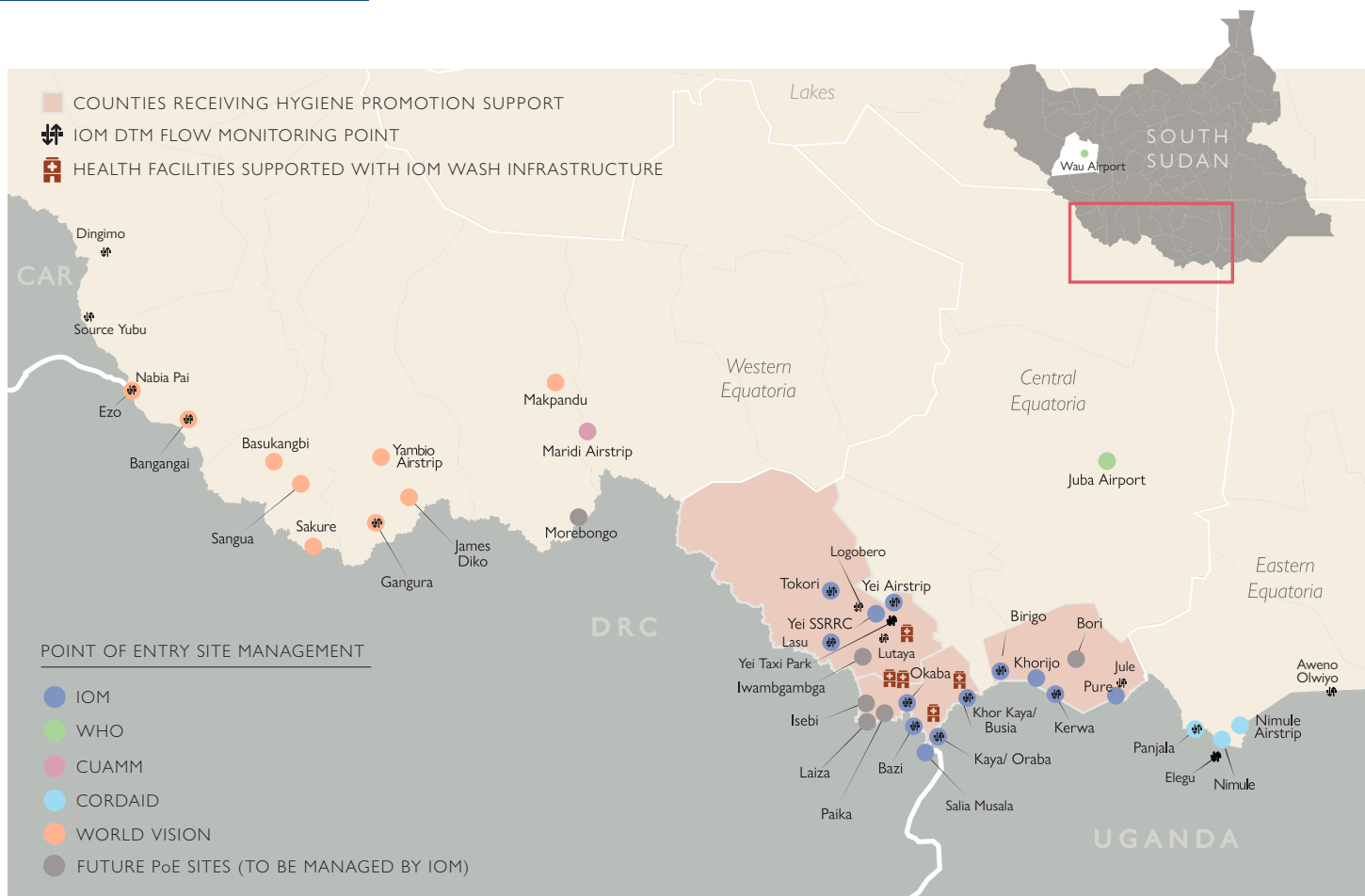

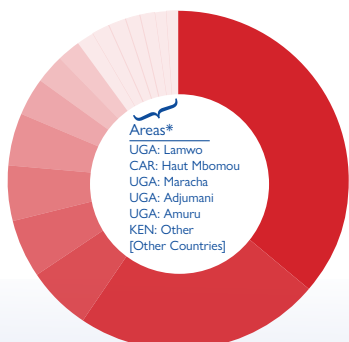

ORIGIN OF ENTRANTS TO SOUTH SUDAN

During this reporting Week, a total of 6,113 entrants were surveyed. 84.5% of surveyed travellers were South Sudanese nationals, 8.7% were Ugandan, 3.3% were from DRC, 1.3% were from CAR and 1% were Kenyan. Entrant origin information is self-reported.

WEEKLY OVERVIEW

- Active screening ongoing in 13 Points of Entry (PoE) sites: Yei airstrip, Yei SSRRC, Tokori, Lasu, Kaya, Bazi, Salia Musala, Okaba, Khor Kaya (along Busia Uganda Border) in Morobo County, Pure, Kerwa, Khorjo in Kajo keji and Birigo in Lainya County.
- Construction of a new PoE in Bori, Kajo-Keji County is ongoing. WASH completed construction of primary and secondary screening shades. In addition, rehabilitation of the existing incinerator and construction of waste pit for the medical waste management at Kaya PHCC is ongoing.
- DTM opened a new FMP Jale (Litoba) (in Kajo-Keji county), which brings the total number of FMPs to 21, of which six are operated on the Uganda side of the border, in partnership with DTM Uganda.

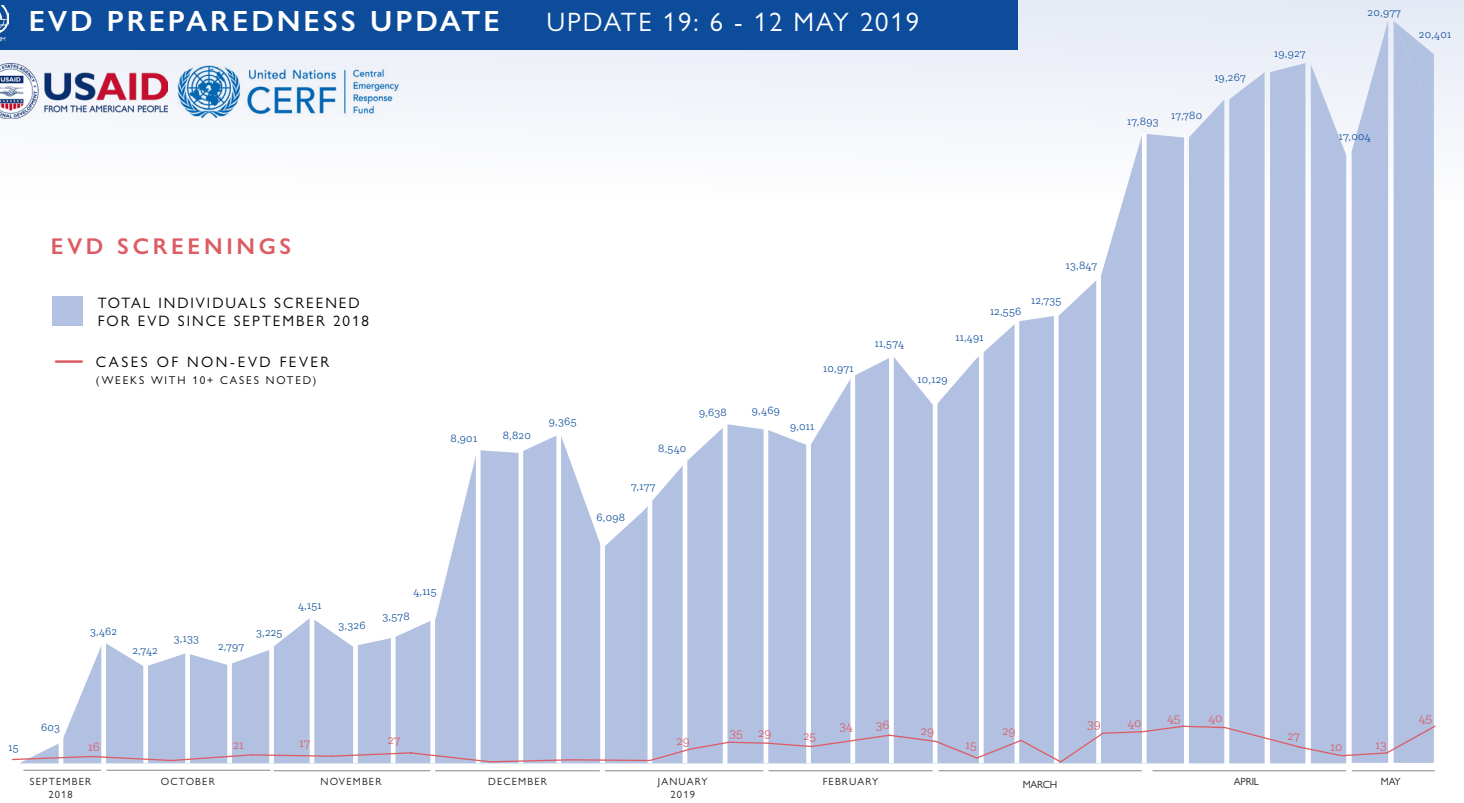


HEALTH FACILITIES SUPPORTED THROUGH WASH ASSISTANCE: **5**

HEALTH UPDATES

In Week 19, 20,401 inbound travelers to South Sudan were screened on EVD exposure and symptoms. Primary screening detected a total of 45 non-EVD fever cases in five PoEs: eleven in Birigo, nine in Kerwa, one in Khorijo, nineteen in Bazi and five in Kaya. During secondary screening, 12 cases recorded normal temperatures after subsequent temperature measurements. All the rest were treated for malaria and respiratory tract infections in the respective health facilities near the PoEs.

WASH UPDATES

IOM continued hygiene promotion activities in and around the PoE sites (Yei SSRRC screening point, Pure, Morobo, Khorijo, Kaya, Gimunu, Tokori, Marakonye, Attende, Salia-Musala, Busia (Khor-Kaya), Kerwa, Bazi, Berigo and Lojulo). Hygiene promotion activities were conducted at houses, markets and water points, reaching approximately 4,332 individuals (1,575 males, 1,017 females, 799 boys, 941 girls) during this reporting week.

DTM UPDATES

Twenty FMPs, including six operated in cooperation with DTM Uganda, submitted data for 6 – 12 of May on time, while one was unable to do so as a result of access challenges. Based on the available data, 6,113 people were surveyed on arrival to South Sudan during the reporting period. The main regions of departure were Koboko (36.3% of respondents) in Uganda and Ituri (23.3%) in DRC. 57.7% of respondents reported going to Morobo County, followed by 9.2% to Juba County and 8.7% to Kajo-Keji County. 84.4% of respondents reported being South Sudanese nationals, followed by 8.7% with Ugandan and 3.2% with DRC nationality.

SECURITY & ACCESS CHALLENGES

Access to five POEs in Morobo county particularly in Lujulu area; Isebi, Morebongo, Laiza, Paika, Iwambagambga/Kemba; remains a challenge due to the security situation.

Poor communication network including internet and mobile in YeI is still a challenge.

Insecurity in Lasu and Tokori remains to be a challenge that prevents access to the PoE sites making supervision difficult. Remote monitoring is done for these locations.

COORDINATION NOTES

IOM continues to actively participate in the national level coordination meetings such as SAG, NTF and TWG meetings including the IPC/WASH, Border Health and Points of Entry (BH &PoE), Epi & Surveillance, Risk Communications Social Mobilization and Access and Security Technical Working Groups (TWGs).

IOM is regularly conducting monitoring & supportive supervision at all the PoE sites. During this reporting week, IOM conducted monitoring and supportive supervision to Kajo Keji and Morobo counties.
