


### IOM Supported Health Facilities



### Overview

During this quarter, IOM South Sudan's Migration Health Unit (MHU) continue to provide life-saving primary health care services to vulnerable populations residing inside and outside of PoCs, including internally displaced persons (IDPs), returnees, and flood-affected host-communities in Unity, Upper Nile, Western Bahr El Ghazal, and Central Equatoria. In addition, MHU provided HIV prevention, testing, and treatment services for key populations in various locations across the country and is actively involved in COVID-19 and EVD preparedness and response activities. During this quarter, IOM supported 25 health facilities with primary health care and routine immunizations, deployed two rapid response team (RRT) missions, provided HIV services across eight states, and supported three points of entry (PoEs) with COVID-19/ EVD screening. Through support from GAVI, a total of 10,047 children were vaccinated for different antigens. In addition, a total of 1,847 women and girls of reproductive age were vaccinated for Tetanus and Diphtheria (TD).

## Rapid Response Team Missions

### RRT Mission in Pibor Oral Cholera vaccine (OCV) campaign

Following excessive flooding in Pibor, IOM conducted a mass Oral Cholera Vaccination (OCV) campaign to protect the community from an anticipated cholera outbreak. IOM provided a range of support, including technical knowledge, coordination, procurement and logistics, and communication. To manage the implementation of the campaign, IOM developed a micro-plan in collaboration with partners such as Ministry of Health/County Health Department, WHO, UNICEF and Live Well. Based on the agreed micro-plan, the OCV campaign was conducted in Pibor county from 2 April 2020 for six days. A total of 22,476 People above the age of one were targeted through the OCV campaign, and 16,455 (73.2%) people received the oral cholera vaccine from 31

March to 8 April 2020. Challenges faced during the campaign included the inability access the villages and areas where the communities were displaced due to high water levels.

### RRT Mission in Kajo Keji

IOM Rapid Response Teams (RRT) missions provided emergency primary health care services to returnees and conflict-affected host communities in Kajo Keji County, targeting three hard to reach areas of return in Jalimo, Kinyiba, and Bori. In addition to providing these services, IOM supported the capacity building of the Ministry of Health staff on basic consultation, surveillance, and reporting. During the mission, the following was conducted:

- 6,834 outpatient consultations were conducted;
- 5,772 people were reached with health promotional messages
- 45 health workers trained on common illnesses management, including COVID-19 prevention


## COVID-19 / Ebola Virus Disease

IOM continued supporting nine points of entry (PoE) screening sites in April 2020 and five PoE screening sites in May and June 2020, where a total of 75,152 travelers were screened for COVID-19/EVD.

Additionally, IOM supported three health facilities near the PoEs where 1,329 individuals were seen in the outpatient clinic, 895 people were reached with information on EVD, and a total of 102 individuals screened for EVD/COVID-19 in the health facilities.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the EVD National Taskforce requested that IOM continue managing the PoEs that are also considered a high priority in the COVID-19 National Operational Plan, which include Juba International Airport (JIA), Nimule Checkpoint, and Wau airport.

## HIV and AIDS Programme



The HIV and AIDS programme continued to reach key populations, including female sex workers (FSWs) and their clients, and other vulnerable populations in the PoCs and host community. IOM provided a comprehensive package of services in and outside of PoCs, which include weekly awareness-raising sessions, and HIV testing and treatment at Anti-Retroviral Therapy (ART) sites within IOM PHC facilities. IOM also worked with implementing partners to conduct sensitization and awareness sessions, as well as HIV counseling and testing for key populations. In Q2 2020, IOM reached 4,146 key populations (KPs) individuals and 5,701 IDPs with HIV messages. In addition, IOM tested 1,667 KPs and 763 IDPs, of which 76 KPs and 42 IDPs tested positive, and 116 positive cases commenced treatment and counseling.
