## Media Reports

- ISLAMABAD: Federal Minister for Water and Power Khwaja Asif said on Wednesday that the government was committed to providing all necessary support to Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs) of North Waziristan.

Presiding over a meeting about ongoing relief activities for the IDPs, Khwaja Asif emphasised the need for collective efforts to address the issue of IDPs and urged ministers to make their contribution to alleviating the suffering of their brothers and sisters who had become displaced because of the ongoing operation by armed forces against the Taliban.

He said the army operation would continue till the last terrorist was eliminated. He said it was a time to demonstrate greater level of unity by all political forces.

- Minister for SAFRON retired Lt Gen Abdul Qadir Baloch briefed the meeting on the relief activities for the IDPs. He said the government was ensuring provision of basic amenities to the IDPs including security, supply of electricity and transport facilities. He said so far the IDPs were being provided food, shelter, clean drinking water and medical facilities. Most of the IDPs used government vehicles for movement and they were carrying their cattle along, the minister said. The government, he said, had provided transport to the IDPs to shift them to safer places.
- PESHAWAR: Uncertainty, food insecurity and the lack of proper shelter are not the only problems the internally displaced persons of North Waziristan are facing. Bannu's harsh weather and lack of facilities in hospitals are making matters worse for them.

Nearly 6,000 displaced people suffering from various ailments have reportedly been brought in to the District Headquarters Hospital, Bannu. However, the facility is struggling to provide them proper services in the face of shortages of both staff and medicines.

Requesting anonymity, a doctor at Bannu hospital told *The Express Tribune* via telephone more than 6,000 displaced patients, a majority of them children and women, have visited DHQ since the arrivals began.

"The most common conditions being reported are diarrhoea, malaria, skin infections, cholera and dehydration," he said. "As there is a shortage of medicines, we have to instruct patients to buy them from pharmacies."

"Our medicines have nearly run out but the number of patients keeps increasing every day," said the doctor.

For his part, Bannu DHQ Medical Superintendent (MS) Dr Jehangir Khan disagreed with the complaints of a medicine shortage. "All necessary medicines are available in all three public hospitals of Bannu. There is no shortage and the displaced people are being treated," he claimed.

Jehangir added that they have made special arrangements for these families in all hospitals. "We have cancelled the leave of all staffers and have ensured that doctors are available 24 hours a day," said the MS.

"We have brought in doctors from Bannu Medical College and requested the provincial health department to send women doctors as well," claimed Jehangir.

The displaced families, however, are dissatisfied with the health care. Hameesh Khan told *The Express Tribune* on Wednesday that when the military operation started in the agency, his family initially decided to move to Afghanistan, however, relatives convinced them to move to Bannu instead as it was within the country.

"We walked for three days under the harsh sun to reach Bannu but after we arrived here we realised there are no facilities available for displaced persons," said the father of five.

Khan said that due to the hot weather many of his family members had fallen ill. "I have brought my two children to the DHQ hospital as they are suffering from diarrhoea and malaria but there are no facilities available here," claimed Khan.

He added that the hospital was flooded with patients who were mostly displaced families and there was a shortage of doctors. He appealed to the government to send teams of doctors to the DHQ along with medicines and the equipment to treat children in particular.

Ameen Gul Wazir, another displaced person, faced the death of a child on his way to Bannu. "The journey was difficult, the weather too hot and then we had to wait in long lines at the check post," he said. "We are accustomed to cold weather; our children cannot stand the heat."

Several of Wazir's children have diarrhoea and he took them to the DHQ hospital in Bannu. "There are no doctors or medicines here. They don't even have separate facilities for women," added Wazir.

### **NHN, Government and Non Government (Humanitarian Organizations) Interventions**

- The NHN established and facilitated IDPs committee had a meeting with CM- KP last day. The committee was invited for IFTAR dinner by CM- KP. The committee had over their demand list to CM- KP which are listed below:
  - ⇒ *Registration points* need to be increased and registration Span must be extended beyond July 15, 2014 in order to register the whole DPs lot
  - ⇒ *Special registration process* should be introduced for women headed and orphan DPs having no CNIC
  - ⇒ The *cash assistance* announced by national and provincial governments for DPs are not sufficient. It must be reviewed and increased
  - ⇒ The quantity of *food packages* is not according to the needs of DPs. Some items must be added in order to cater the demand of a family
  - ⇒ In the extreme hot weather and increased load shedding, *Water cooler, water fans and insecticide bed nets* need to be provided to DPs
  - ⇒ *Tents* are needed for IDPs shelter in host communities as the existing space within the host's homes are very low
  - ⇒ Clothes and shoes are needed for IDPs according to weather
  - ⇒ Sufficient Livestock fodder and medicines is also a requirement
  - ⇒ SHUHADA packages should be announced for those families who lost their dearest ones while moving from NWA to other districts
  - ⇒ Free education facilities should be provided to suffered students of NWA in other national and provincial institutions
  - ⇒ The cash assistance from KP government for rental purposes is too low and it can be increased as the rents of houses are quite high in the area
  - ⇒ Spaces should be spared and announced by KP government for establishment of IDPs graveyard
- A coordination meeting held today at 45 Engineering Division office. Military, PDMA, FDMA, UNOCHA, PHF and NHN representatives participated in this meeting. Lt- General Akhtar Rao gave briefing about the current IDPs scenario. Coordinated and combined response was agreed. Decisions made are mentioned below:
  - ⇒ Military will act as DPs support secretariat
  - ⇒ As per GoP decision Military welcome the response of national and international humanitarian response

- ⇒ Military, FDMA, PDMA and humanitarian actors will be engaged in coordinated response as per their mandate
- ⇒ Response should be made in such a way that resources might not be wasted and special care should be made to avoid any overlapping or duplication.
- ⇒ All response should be made through clusters approach
- ⇒ PDMA and FDMA upon the capacity of an organization will forward the organization's papers to military for security clearance
- ⇒ Priority areas of intervention will be discussed and decided mutually from time to time
- ⇒ MIRA assessment will be started from tomorrow in the lead of PDMA and on the bases of assessments results response will be designed
- ⇒ Military after completing their initial task will hand over the Food distribution to WFP as a whole
- ⇒ Military is of the view that all clusters should be on ground from 21<sup>st</sup> July
- ⇒ Coordination meeting will be held in next week again

### **Recommendations from NHN**

- It is recommended to pay attention to separate registration desks, distribution queues and common community places for women to address women feeling of insecurity at crowded places
- An elaborate mechanism should be evolved and disseminated for providing assistance to female headed households; women without effective male support and women with no CNICs
- Appropriate health care facilities for women especially for pregnant and lactating women are need in the areas of displacement
- Concern authorities should make available the presence of female health staff at facilities
- As the findings indicated 30% women suffering from stress, psychosocial support should be provided in response to the stress and trauma created by displacement;
- Recreational/learning opportunities and psychosocial support should be immediately provided to children. Establishment of protective spaces/ child friendly spaces is highly recommended to help bring children back to normal
- Every attempt should be made to address the needs of women and adolescent girls in different assistance packages
- Government and humanitarian actors should consider extending registration of IDPs and provision of food and NIFs assistance to other districts hosting IDPs from North Waziristan
- Information campaign on procedures of registration as well as regime of assistance should be strengthened
- The existing distribution centers/ points should enhance presence of female staff members to allow access to displaced women
- Specialized services for older persons and persons with disabilities are needed to ensure inclusion of all persons with specific needs.
