A sound humanitarian investment



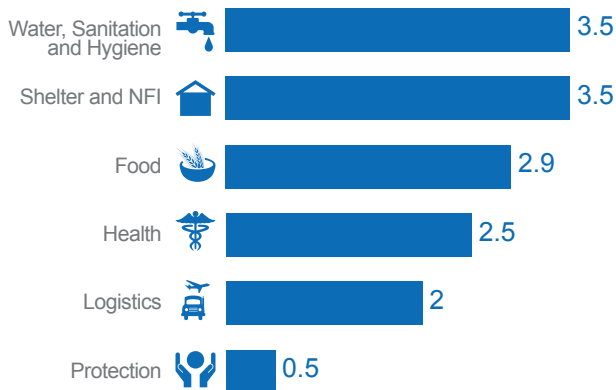
On 25 April, a 7.8 magnitude earthquake struck Nepal affecting more than eight million people. Within 48 hours of the disaster, the Emergency Relief Coordinator announced a \$15 million allocation from CERF to help kick-start life-saving work.

The money helped partners to quickly scale-up the humanitarian response and provide immediate aid, including the provision of clean water, food, medical supplies and emergency shelter.

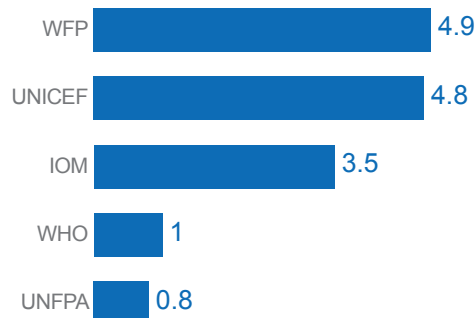
CERF funds have also enabled the overall response. For instance, by supporting UN Humanitarian Air Services, CERF has helped get critical humanitarian supplies and personnel to hard-to-reach places where people need help.

Allocation by sector (in US\$ million)

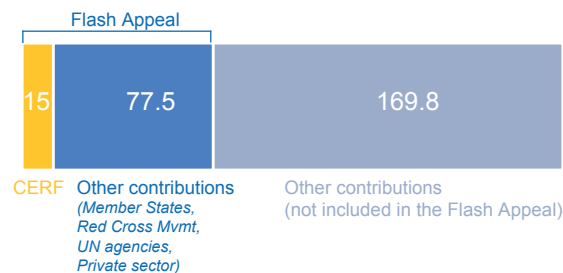


Allocation by agency (in US\$ million)



Total humanitarian contributions to Nepal*

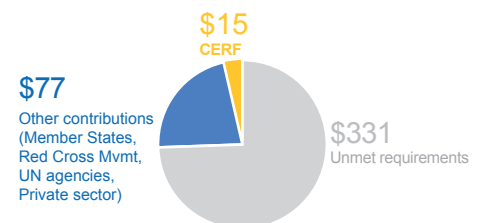
