

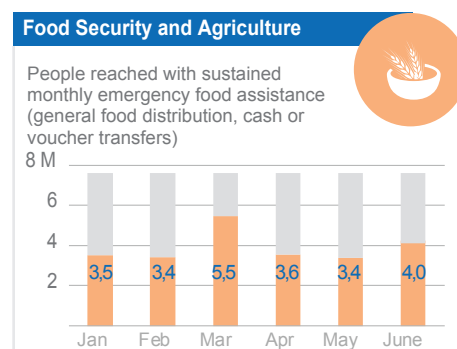
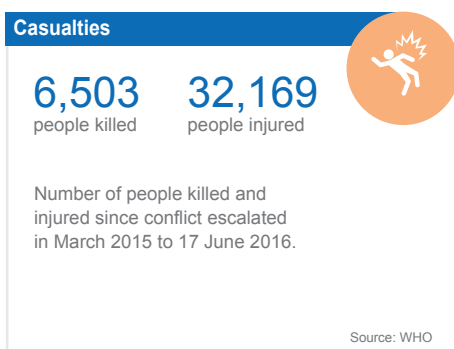
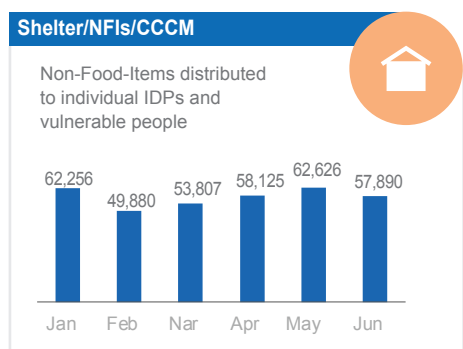
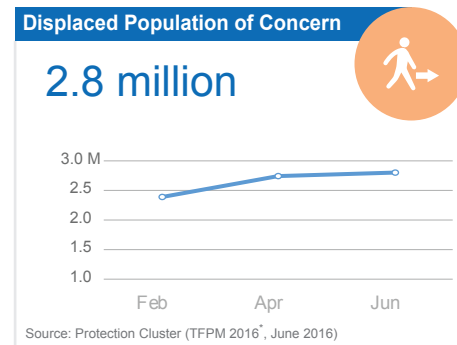
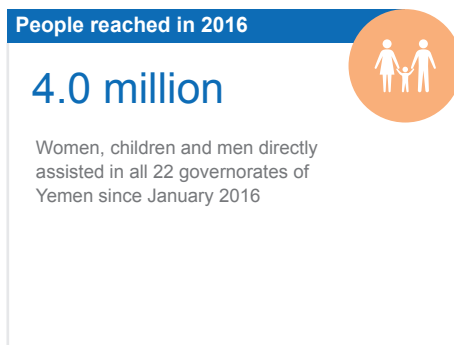
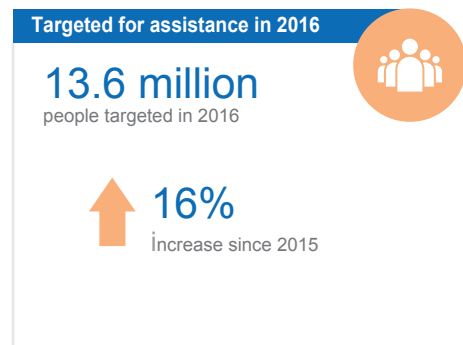
SITUATION OVERVIEW

In the absence of a political solution, violations and abuses continue to occur in the context of widespread insecurity and in disregard of international humanitarian and human rights law. Yemen's economy is now near collapse following 16 months of conflict and import and export restrictions.

Across Yemen's 22 governorates, Humanitarians have reached close to 4 million people with some form of humanitarian protection or assistance since January 2016. The needs, however, are becoming more acute, particularly among the 2.8 million men, women, and children that have been displaced in search of safety, security and livelihoods.

The US\$1.8 billion appeal has received a little over 26 per cent of funding.

Improve immediate household availability of and access to food for the most vulnerable people in Yemen.

Needs

Approximately 51% of the population (14 million Yemenis) are food insecure with 7 million severely food insecure. The food insecurity is expected to further deteriorate due to conflict-induced scarcity of basic commodities, disruption of markets, high prices of essential commodities, and dwindling livelihoods & income opportunities.

Response

An average of 3.7 million people per month were reached with regular emergency food assistance (general food distribution and cash/voucher transfers) in May and June 2016; while 196,588 people have received emergency livelihoods assistance (agricultural, fisheries and livestock inputs) during the January to June period. Given the low level of funding, unless more funds are received, emergency food assistance and much of the emergency livelihoods assistance might be stopped.

Provide comprehensive, essential and life-saving healthcare services to affected and vulnerable populations; reinforce health system and strengthen resilience, livelihoods, and early recovery activities.

Needs

Rapid response to the ongoing dengue outbreak which has claimed 22,263 cases between Jan-Jun 2016, with 25 deaths, is the priority need currently. Additionally, support to life-saving services through referral hospitals, provision of medicines/supplies and continuation of an integrated package of primary health care (PHC) services to affected population remain Cluster priorities.

Response

in the months of May and June 2016, cluster partners have provided essential and life-saving medicines/supplies and kits; supported PHC, immunization and outreach activities. By supporting major hospitals with fuel, the cluster has reached nearly half a million (487,845) beneficiaries.

Deliver quality lifesaving nutrition services for children under 5 and Pregnant and Lactating women through CMAM and IYCF services as well as prevent malnutrition through provision of micronutrient, and blanket supplementary feeding for children under 2.

Needs

Nearly 3 million people (74% children under 5 and 26% pregnant and lactating women) and almost 1.3 million children are acutely malnourished and require humanitarian nutrition assistance including treatment for severe and moderate acute malnutrition, provision of supplementary feeding for pregnant and lactating mothers, promotion, protection and support for breast feeding, micronutrient supplementation and blanket supplementary feeding for children 6-24 months is a priority.

Response

The response so far reached 460,486 children under 5 and pregnant and lactating women through different nutrition interventions. The cumulative achievement is almost 20% compared to the target of 2.4 million people.

Provide adequate shelter and non-food items to displaced persons in liveable and dignified settings.

Needs

Limited funding is the major factor impeding the implementation of activities to meet the identified urgent needs, particularly finding alternative shelter solutions for IDPs in schools. Rehabilitation of collective centres, damaged/destroyed houses and support for IDPs in host families and rental accommodation (over 70% of IDPs) are critical priorities. The prolonged nature of the displacement is putting a strain on the scarce resources and therefore exposing both the IDPs and host families to heightened vulnerability.

Response

In the months of May and June 2016, over 124,596 people have benefited from the distribution of Non-Food Items (NFIs) across Yemen. Also over 58,230 people have benefited from the provision of Emergency Shelter Kits/Materials, 297 people were assisted with cash support for rental subsidies and 19 IDP collective centres were rehabilitated.

Address the education concerns of populations affected by humanitarian crises in a predictable and well coordinated manner.

Needs

Ongoing fighting continued to threaten children's return back to schools and their continuation of study. In particular, schools need to be urgently rehabilitated or temporary learning spaces need to be established to enable the close to 2 million children that remain out of school to return. There is also a growing need of Psychosocial Educational Support (PSS) for students.

Response

Since January 2016, close to 90,000 children have been helped assisted through the repair of classrooms; over 215,000 students were provided with schools supplies; over 114,000 children were provided with psychosocial services, and over 6,800 children benefitted from temporary classrooms.

Provision of immediate life-saving services and direct protection assistance to migrants and refugees.

Needs

Migrants and refugees are in need of immediate assistance such as food, WASH, health, temporary shelter, and protection. In May and June, 24,208 migrants, asylum seekers and refugees were estimated to have newly arrived in Yemen, crossing the Red and Arabian Seas. This brings the total to 64,170 migrants and refugees arriving in Yemen in 2016.

Response

Partners provided a range of humanitarian assistance to refugees and migrants. The response for migrants included identifying vulnerabilities and providing immediate assistance to unaccompanied minors, GBV cases, and victims of human rights violations. The response for refugees also included distribution of food, water, NFIs, shelter, health, and protection.

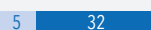

Logistics support to emergency supply of fuel, storage, road, sea and air transport assistance.

Needs

Humanitarian organisations in Yemen face a number of specific logistical challenges that continue to impede their ability to deliver relief supplies, such as: limited access, unpredictable fuel availability and bureaucratic impediments.

Response

In June, 106,944 liters of diesel and 39,078 liters of petrol were distributed to 22 organisations in Al Hudaydah, Sana'a and Aden. As the current stock of Logs Cluster is 1,481,964 liters of diesel and petrol, the Logistics Cluster did not purchase additional fuel in June. The cluster launched in June 2016 a Fuel Steering Committee. Starting from May, the Logistics Cluster has established a regular passenger transport schedule, with weekly trips from Djibouti to Aden.

Support the repair and maintenance of affected WASH systems, and direct provision of WASH services and items to affected people.

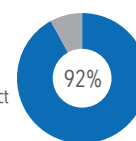
Needs

Needs of emergency WASH assistance for IDPs and host communities continue for the most vulnerable people in most governorates. Urban water and sanitation systems in major cities in the country continue to deteriorate, and urgent support is needed to keep these systems from collapsing. This is specifically the case for Taiz, Hajjah, Amanat Al Asimah, and cities in Hadramaut and Shabwah. Scabies and dengue cases in hot spot locations are also raising concerns amongst WASH cluster partners, and close coordination is ongoing with the health cluster to coordinate response.

Response

The total of overall direct beneficiaries receiving WASH humanitarian assistance increased with 200,000 people during May and June. Water trucking started in Hadramaut, and more latrines for IDPs were constructed in Al Hudaydah, Al Jawf, Amran and Taizz governorates. In 13 out of 15 governorates, hygiene kits were distributed to a total of 160,000 conflict affected people. Fuel support for urban water networks continued in most locations, and started in Al Dhale'e and Al Mahwit.

Monitor protection risks and rights violations; provide protection information and services, promote the centrality of protection through all humanitarian actions, and advocate for the protection of affected people.

Needs

With over 2.8 million people directly affected by displacement, the needs of IDPs, returnees and host communities continue to be huge. Protection concerns include lack of safety, limited freedom of movement, child recruitment, GBV violations, evictions, lack of documentation and violations of human rights and IHL.

Response

Response actions include targeted psychosocial, medical, legal and cash assistance to GBV survivors, vulnerable groups, and groups with specific needs. Services are provided at community centres, youth clubs and child-friendly spaces. There are mechanisms to monitor, document and record IHL and human rights, such as UNICEF's MRM.

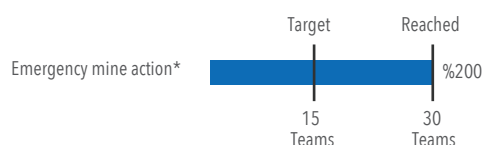
Protect communities from the threat of mines and UXO, reduce risks rising from undisposed waste and strengthen local economies and infrastructure.

Needs

New landmine/UXO contamination is registered in more than 15 governorates, some of which at critical level. Solid waste collection has dwindled in at least 6 key governorates. Households' access to savings has halved and access to social welfare benefits decreased by two-thirds compared to pre-escalation of conflict levels. Estimated monthly losses reach YER 68 million for large firms.

Response

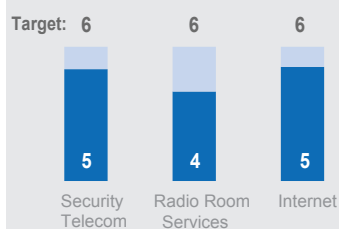
Mine/UXO clearance is ongoing in 10 governorates with over 11,000 Explosive Remnants of War (ERWs) recovered and defused, reducing threat to life in the immediate environment of over 3 million people. Some 2,781 victims of mines and other ERWs were assisted in their recovery. Close to 8,500 individuals were employed in cash for work interventions focusing on community infrastructure and over 3,500 micro-businesses were supported. About 460,000 people are benefiting from emergency cleaning campaign. Over 12,000 tons of accumulated waste hazardous to health were removed in 9 governorates.

EMERGENCY TELECOMMUNICATIONS

Provide life-saving telecommunications, data services and power charging stations to support humanitarian action and increase staff safety.

Needs

As the ETC is a support cluster, the affected population is the entire response community. Humanitarians continue to need access to Internet services in operational hubs and on the inter-agency mission boat.

Response

The ETC has established a back-up connectivity hub and a solar charging station at the common UN building in Al Hudaydah. In Sa'ada, the ETC assessed the premises of an NGO to host a back-up connectivity hub. In Ibb, the ETC has completed the installation of a COMCEN. The ETC provides Internet services on the inter-agency boat, between Djibouti and Aden. Global and local ETC coordination meetings are being organized regularly.

* Demining activities have accelerated since March. Given the high degree of contamination, more numerous, smaller teams have been deployed at the district level in 9 of the 15 contaminated Governorates. As a result, the initial target has been met and exceeded. While activities are progressing rapidly, the needs remain large.
