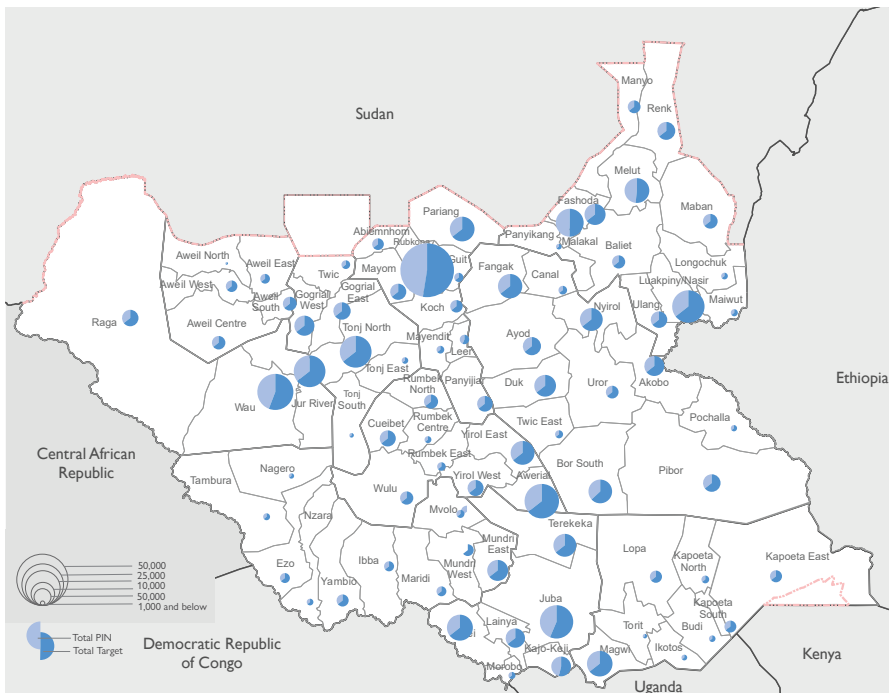

NATIONAL CLUSTER UPDATE

Building the capacity of the CCCM community in South Sudan, in the month of June the CCCM Cluster held the first of several Capacity Building and Training Workshops. Attended by 38 participants (30 male/8 females) from existing HRP partners (I/NGOs) as well as other national NGOs with an interest in implementing CCCM activities as part of the cluster going forward, the 2 day workshop was an opportunity for the CCCM cluster to share best practices and global guidelines on effective camp management, as well as for partners to reflect on lessons learnt and the challenges of the context specific needs of IDPs in South Sudan.

The CCCM cluster was also involved in the first round of allocations under the Country Pool Fund South Sudan Humanitarian Fund (SSHF) which was launched in May 2021, with \$50 million funding divided into 3 different envelopes. During this process, the cluster strongly advocated to address the key service gaps identified by camp management agencies inside the PoC/ IDP camps. The CCCM cluster partners will receive 2.5 million USD under envelope 1 and 2, to carry out the static and mobile CCCM activities, while an additional 16.5 million has been allocated to multiple clusters to address the key service gaps in PoC/IDP camps.

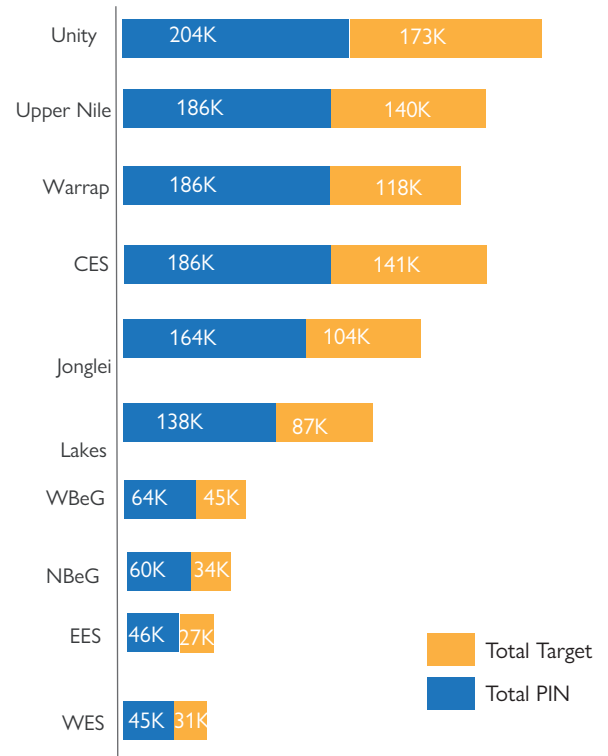
CCCM NEEDS OVERVIEW AND TARGET

RESPONSE OVERVIEW

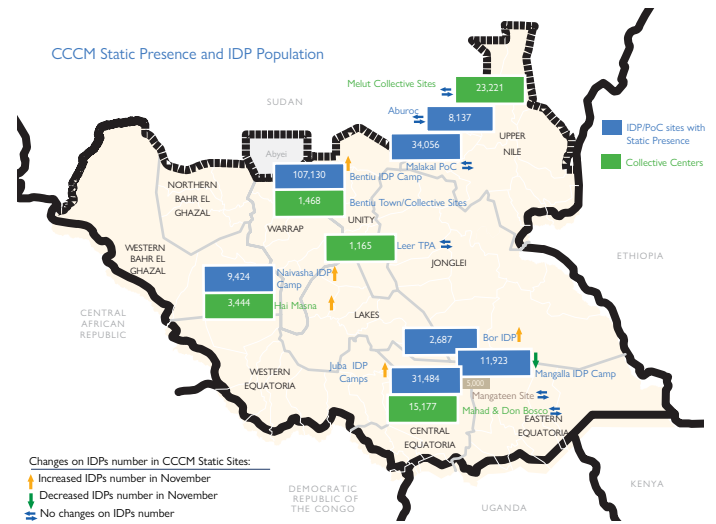
Of the 1.2 million people in need of CCCM support in 2021 approximately 872,000 displaced persons live in spontaneous sites or informal settlements or with host communities, around 187,000 are in PoC/former PoC sites and more than 231,000 live in collective sites. The transition of the PoCs to conventional IDP sites, which has so far taken for 5 of the 6 sites in South Sudan, may further entrench protracted displacement and the associated burden on displaced people, returnees and host communities.

Unusually extreme flooding, in addition to the upsurge in sub-national violence, especially in Jonglei, Unity, Upper Nile, Warrap and Lakes, means that displaced people are expected to remain in the areas where they have taken refuge until conditions improve in their areas of origin. Ensuring that these people continue to receive adequate services, and mitigate against protection concerns and other risks and vulnerabilities, CCCM cluster will continue to maintain an overview of agencies providing services, the quality of their services and identify site level needs and gaps.

As of June 490 IDPs were reached by 7 CCCM cluster partners, who responded in various IDP sites and displacement locations where they provided IDPs with CCCM services including coordination of service provision, leadership training, and monitoring service provisions inside the IDP/POC sites.

UPPER NILE

PoC & IDP Sites

- Following the return of IDPs to their areas of origin to the counties of Riangnom, Baliet and Adong in Baliet in April, the CCCM cluster state focal point participated in the inter cluster post return monitoring mission to assess how well they had integrated.
- DRC CM conducted three day CCCM training for 36 participants from the Sector and Block leaders in the PoC and humanitarian agencies operating in Malakal. Focused on core CCCM principles, the topics of the training included introduction to CCCM, coordination, roles and responsibilities, community participation, engagement, and information sharing.
- Through funding from the Bureau for Humanitarian Assistance (BHA), DRC continues to support new arrivals to Abu Roc settlement, most of whom require immediate shelter support. In the month of June 50 new households were provided with NFI packages comprised of a blanket, sleeping mat, solar torch, plastic sheet and nylon rope).
- Strengthening community governance structures and enabling them to adequately represent the diverse IDP population, DRC distributed items such as rain coats, wheelbarrows, hammers, digging bars, hand saw, musical instruments and sugar to several sectorial committees in Abu Roc settlement.
- In support of the activities of the youth committee, DRC constructed for them an office, which was officially handed over with donations of 20 plastic chairs, 3 plastic tables, 10 footballs, 6 volleyballs, 24 training reflector vest jackets, and 2 mega phones.

Covid-19 Update

- DRC carried out a number of activities this month to raise awareness of COVID 19 prevention measures. In addition to distributing facemasks in Abu Roc, DRC camp management also carried out awareness raising sessions for 250 participants in Malakal town and Padit and Pathow Bomas in Ogod Payam.

UNITY

Former PoC & IDP Sites

- There has been an increase in robberies reported in the IDP camp, with several incidents reported this month, including the theft of WASH equipment supplying water to S3, B1 and armed gunmen snatching valuables leaving 1 IDP with serious gunshot wounds. The deteriorating security situation has been flagged to government officials through RRC, RRP and, OCHA and discussions are ongoing between government officials and the IDP leadership community to find a lasting solution.
- The temporary closure of the Camp High Commissioner's office, due to disagreements between the local RRC and the IDPs on who should be elected to this position, has created a vacuum in camp leadership. IOM camp management is working closely with community leaders, RRP and UNMISS to come to an amicable agreement.

Covid-19 Update

- Sensitization on COVID 19 and Malaria preventive measures and rumors tracking continue in coordination with the health cluster, RCCE, and other relevant partners.

WESTERN BAHR EL GHAZAL

Former PoC & IDP Sites

- At the end of July IOM health unit will no longer be present in Naivasha IDP camp, handing over the clinic to the State Ministry of Health. In preparation for this IOM camp management conducted a meeting with the Ministry of Health to discuss their readiness for the transfer of the health facility and taking over the responsibility for providing medical support to the IDPs.
- DTM supported by IOM camp management undertook an exercise to establish the exact IDP population of Hai Masna IDP site, those who arrived in 2020 and those who came more recently in 2021. In total 3449 IDPs have been registered, and following this verification a coordination meeting was conducted with partners to support the IDPs (2020 and 2021 caseloads) who do not have access to food assistance.
- CCCM coordinated with SNFI cluster to support the new caseload of 2,700 IDPs who arrived in 2021 in Hai Masna with NFIs, as this was identified as an urgent need of the community. Thus far 11 households/19 individuals have been allocated new shelters in Hai Masna, with more distributions being planned.

Covid-19 Update

- Camp management continue with the dissemination of COVID 19 prevention measures, reaching the communities through messaging on portable sound systems, as well as door to door sensitisation.

CENTRAL EQUATORIA

Former PoC & IDP Sites

- Communal violence erupting in Juba IDP camp 3 between youth from the Koch & Leer community resulted in 24 people being wounded during the four days fighting. Three of the seriously wounded were transferred to Juba Teaching Hospital, with one them passing away.
- ACTED camp management conducted a three days' camp coordination and camp management training for the 35 members of the newly elected camp management leadership committee leadership in Juba IDP camp 3.
- In support of education across both Juba IDP camps UNICEF distributed school materials including the new curriculum text books to three primary schools. ACTED Gender Section distributed 600 dignity kits (underwear and soap) to adolescent girls across 9 schools.
- Mangalla IDP camp is expanding, with an additional 3 site (Bor-road, Ramciel and Aperpiny) bringing the total sites in the camp to 10, and exacerbating an already precarious situation in which there are huge gaps in services delivery to the needs of the IDPs community in Health, WASH, Shelter and Protection.

Covid-19 Update

- In order to support the movement of the COVID 19 high level task force committee responsible for the dissemination of COVID prevention measures in Juba IDP camps 1 and 3, 6 bicycles and 10 visibility t-shirts were distributed to members of the committee.

JONGLEI

Former PoC & IDP Sites

- ACTED camp management distributed NFIs (1 blankets, 1 sleeping mat and 1 mosquito nets) to 100 new arrivals families following requests for assistance made via the Complaints and Response desk in the IDP site.
- The issue of the 800HHs unregistered new arrivals, who came from flood affected villages in 2020, and are currently unable to access any services, remains and lack of food is a critical gap. WFP Scope and IOM DTM are aiming to have these IDPs registered and verified by the end of this month.

Covid-19 Update

- Camp management staff continue to broadcast COVID-19 awareness messaging using loud speakers and sound systems around the IDP sites. Moreover, ACTED donated 5,000 non re-usable face masks pupils attending Bor IDPs primary school, following a request from the school administration for these items.

Assessments and Mobile Response

ASSESSMENTS AND MOBILE RESPONSE

During the month of June IOM CCCM Mobile teams conducted follow up and handover missions to displacement sites in Baggari, Bessilia and Bazia Payam to hand over the three Community Centers constructed in Ngoku, Mboro and Gedi through the South Sudan Humanitarian Fund (SSHF). These centers are considered part of the capacity building support to site self-management committees and will serve as a hub for site level coordination and future development programs in the area.

NEW DISPLACEMENTS SITES

- In June, IOM DTM reported about 435 individuals were displaced in Gumruk Payam in Pibor County where 60% are female.
- In addition, IOM DTM team also reported internally displaced people in various locations including 1,267 individuals in Liwolo payam of Kajokeji county, 270 individuals in Adok payam in Leer county and 413 individuals in Melut payam of Melut county.

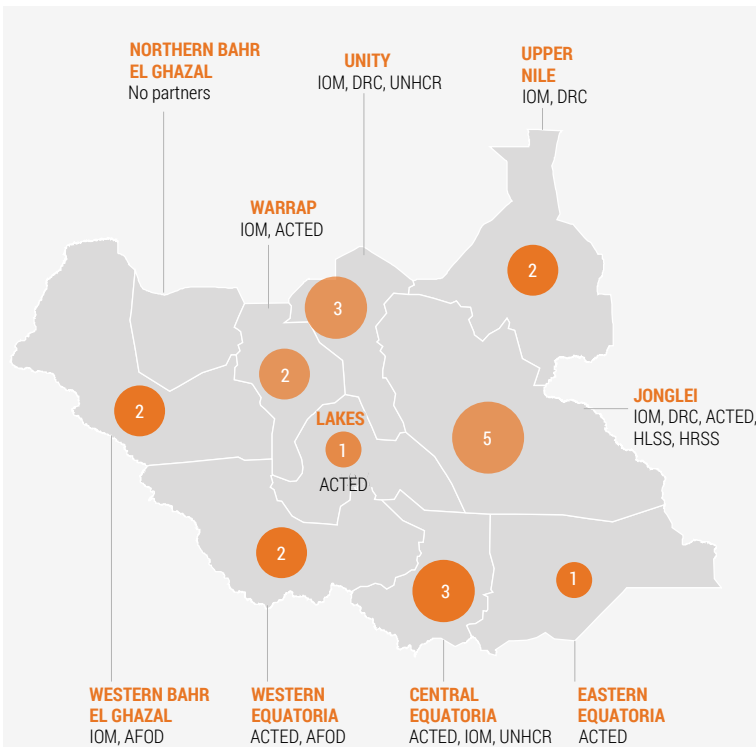
- Also, IOM DTM reported 383 returnees in Leer, Mayom, Guit, Mayendit and Rubokna counties.

OTHER UPDATES

Upon request by OCHA and the CCCM cluster, DTM deployed staff to Pibor from the 18th of May to verify population estimates of recent IDPs in collective sites. Within the period under review, the team visited Gumruk payam to assess locations hosting displaced population and returnees. Total 2,435 IDPs and 15,495 returnees were reported in 15 various locations.

Partners have responded to the humanitarian situation with food, monofilament coil, fishing hook and twines. However, some locations within Gumruk Payam have not yet received any form of humanitarian assistance and are still in need. Finally, focus group discussion conducted showed interest from the displaced population to return home as soon as possible. Mobility Tracking round 11 is currently ongoing and will provide estimates of the displaced and returned population across the entire county.
