

Sudan: Humanitarian Snapshot (31 December 2013)

A total of **6.1 million** people are in need of humanitarian assistance in Sudan. These needs are driven by a series of inter-related trends, including conflict, insecurity, environmental conditions and displacement. Some **2.6 million** people are either refugees or internally displaced people. In 2013, **380,000** people have been newly displaced in Darfur. Following the ongoing conflict in South Sudan, a number of people are currently crossing the border into Sudan.

This snapshot represents figures of people in need of humanitarian assistance and provides information on Sudanese refugees in neighbouring countries.

SPLM-N estimates that in non-Government controlled areas of South Kordofan & Blue Nile there are 800,000 civilians either internally displaced or severely affected by conflict. No humanitarian access from Sudan.

The UN estimates that there are about 100,000 people in the Jebel Marra area either displaced or severely affected by conflict. Virtually no access for humanitarian organizations.
