

Situation Overview and Humanitarian Needs

As of 19 July, 214,228 COVID-19 tests have been carried out in Nigeria with 36,633 testing positive. 37,225 COVID-19 cases had been confirmed. Out of which, there are 789 official deaths recorded across 36 states and the Federal Capital Territory. 8,514 of the cases confirmed were in the last 2 weeks with Lagos, Federal Capital Territory, Oyo, Edo, Delta, Kano, Rivers and Ogun responsible for over 64 percent of these cases.

The Presidential Task Force (PTF) in their weekly briefing, announced that the reasons for the initial delays of Phase 2 (ease of lockdown) implementation were due to non-adherence of the populace to non-pharmaceutical measures and guidelines that were provided by health experts and WHO. As such, based on ongoing discussions, the restrictions that had initially been eased maybe subject to review.

UNICEF's COVID-19 response

RCCE/C4D

UNICEF intensified technical assistance on risk communication and community engagement and capacity building in 17 States. New content focused on the safe provision of home-based care. In Lagos, stakeholders and community influencers were sensitized on the importance of preventative actions on COVID-19 to curb community spread as mask wearing and physical distancing rules are often not adhered to.

UNICEF supported Bauchi State to conduct sensitization sessions in all major markets and motor parks. In Taraba, UNICEF supported training for 176 community-based workers on community-based infection prevention and control in 160 wards across 16 Local Government Areas (LGAs). The sessions were led predominantly by discussions with participants on how to address myths, misconceptions, socio cultural beliefs that create barrier(s) to prevention of COVID-19.

In Kebbi State, the First Lady Dr. Zainab Shinkafi Bagudu and the state team showed gratitude to UNICEF and other partners for their engagement with Civil Society organisation (CSOs)/Non-governmental Organisations (NGOs) on COVID-19 response and primary health care initiatives. CSOs and Community Based Organisations (CBO) received COVID-19 thermometers and other materials such as banners, posters, PPEs, and hand sanitizers.

UNICEF in Kano focused on supporting promotion of COVID-19 testing through house to house mobilization of female caregivers. New communication messages and materials were pre-tested, and a social mobilization plan was developed for Katsina. During Jumma prayers as well as daily prayers, awareness was created on COVID-19 and its preventive measures through announcements. Airing of jingles is ongoing on eight radio stations across Kano, Katsina and Jigawa States.

UNICEF in Anambra State completed a mobile messaging campaign that covered 210 communities across all the 21 LGAs in the state. The National Orientation Agency (NOA)

with the support of UNICEF produced new radio jingles and video skits addressing the issues of improper wearing of facemasks and observing of social distancing protocols.

UNICEF engaged frontline volunteer workers in Niger state where 78 sensitization sessions were conducted with 3,248 communities' members. In Kaduna State, 12 media discussions were held in seven radio stations. Specific communities with new cases were also targeted with focus on barbershop, restaurant and hairdressing staff.

UNICEF Akure office focused on Oyo State as the risk communication pillar engaged with Bodija market with a daily population of approximately 6,000 visitors whose leaders were sensitized on COVID-19 preventive measures and got their assurance for the compliance. 31 reporters were also trained and additional 80 religious and traditional leaders from 14 LGAs were sensitised in Oyo State. NOA held community engagement with Christian leaders and members of the congregation on prevention, symptoms and action to take on COVID-19.

North-east RCCE/C4D response

The Borno Field Office (FO) conducted a rapid assessment on poor adherence to use of facemasks. Findings from the assessment will be used to guide community engagement strategies to promote increase and correct use of facemasks. 1,107 religious leaders were sensitized resulting in 451 mosques/church announcements and 202 Tsangaya schools with 6,881 children were taught measures to prevent COVID-19. Provision of technical support to the RCCE pillar in the COVID-19 committee at the state Public Health Emergency Operation Center (EOC) continues on a regular basis.

Health

UNICEF is providing continued support to the COVID-19 health response under the different functional areas lead by the Presidential Task Force. The Epidemiology and Surveillance pillar conducted a dry run in preparation for the State Training of Trainer on active case search and contact tracing with support from partners, including UNICEF. Stakeholder engagement is underway for setting up connect centres in six states. Tracking of implementation of Surveillance strategies continues at state level, including escalation of alerts/signals and follow up for feedbacks. Engagement with state and other partners has commenced for the deployment of 200 African Centre for Diseases Control community health workers to 10 priority states.

UNICEF supported the development of “Guidelines for Conducting Elections during the COVID-19 Outbreak in Nigeria” in view of forthcoming elections in some states as also an Advisory for Vulnerable Groups to protect elderly citizens and those with pre-existing medical conditions.

The Case Management Training Working Group, of the Federal Ministry of Health, is finalizing plans for COVID-19 Case Management National Training of Trainers, tentatively scheduled from 27th July 2020, involving a cohort of 650 medical professionals, from 42 Federal Tertiary Hospitals and Institutions (FTHIs). This will be followed by cascade trainings of 2,120 health care workers across 56 FTHIs, State Ministries of Health and accredited Private Hospitals supporting the COVID-19 outbreak response.

Shipment of additional laboratory supplies are in process of arriving in country including 29,392 cobas tests, 1000 cobas secondary tubes, 110,000 Thermofisher tests and five Thermofisher calibration plates. At the state level, UNICEF Field Offices continue to provide ongoing technical support to the state EOCs on COVID-19 response.

- UNICEF supported Ondo state to conduct risk assessments and triage patients for home care, given an increase in confirmed cases in the state and limited bed space and human resource. Logistics support was provided to ensure effective conduct of contact tracing and active case search in three high risk LGAs. UNICEF also supported capacity building of 40 laboratory scientists and technicians from Secondary and Tertiary health facilities to increase sample collection sites for COVID-19.
- In Lagos state, UNICEF is collaborating with WHO to train 752 community-based contact tracers and 75 Supervisors. State-level training have been conducted supported by WHO while LGA level trainings, supported by UNICEF, will commence soon.
- UNICEF is supporting Akwa Ibom State EOC with infection, prevention and control (IPC) trainings for primary health care (PHC) workers in LGAs and wards. UNICEF supported Rivers State with the development of real time monitoring tools for risk and emergency management in the context of COVID-19, to be piloted in

two high burden LGAs with UNICEF supporting one LGA and the State supporting the other.

- UNICEF is collaborating with WHO on a project in community-based sample collection in three selected LGAs in Kano state. UNICEF is also supporting the printing of data monitoring tools and risk communication activities.
- UNICEF plans to support Katsina State with logistics on community sample collection and sensitization in three priority LGAs. Plans are in place to support Jigawa state for training of additional 28 Laboratory scientists on sample collection in 12 secondary health facilities and two tertiary health institutions
- UNICEF is providing technical guidance on strengthening LGA rapid response teams in Enugu state. State plans to step up contact tracing, sample collection and testing for increased case detection in Cross River state.
- A COVID-19 community case search pilot in three LGAs of Abia state (Aba South Umuahia North & Ummuneochi) is planned for this week and coming weeks to reach 10,000 persons. Lessons learnt will be used to scale up support to the remaining 14 LGAs, with technical support from UNICEF in collaboration with the state team and WHO.
- In Sokoto state, 312 Health workers have been identified for training at state and LGA levels and 732 at the ward level. To boost testing rate in Sokoto State, seven LGAs with high burden of COVID-19 have been identified, to support them with logistics for daily sample collection.
- UNICEF will provide financial and technical Support to Taraba and Gombe States for State and LGA level training of 175 State PHC managers and 1,182 primary and secondary HF HCWs in Infection Prevention and Control.
- In the north-east, especially Borno State, UNICEF is supporting the state government on logistics for referral services (fueling, maintenance, etc.).

WASH

Hygiene Promotion and Distribution of IEC materials

Awareness on COVID -19 prevention emphasizing on hand washing, and COVID-19 preventive protocols was carried out through ward officers, volunteer hygiene promoters, town announcers with motorized public address units at community level with at least 88,136 people (25,339 female) reached during the week in different LGAs in Bauchi, Jigawa, Kano and Katsina states. The UNICEF-trained Village Hygiene Promoters (VHPs) and WASH Committees, traditional and religious leaders and COVID-19 Action Committees have continued to sensitize community members on preventive measures, signs and symptoms of COVID-19, all eight UNICEF-focused LGAs in Benue and in the nine Internally Displaced Person (IDP) camps. Jingles on COVID-19 awareness and prevention developed in collaboration with C4D continue to be aired daily in English, Pidgin, Hausa, Igbo, Kanuri and Yoruba languages by various radio stations across 24 states continuously reaching an estimated number of 8.5 M people.¹

Provision of WASH Facilities

In Osun state, UNICEF continued to support LGA WASH Departments and State Rural Water Supply and Sanitation Agency (RUWASSA) to leverage established structures for repair and rehabilitation of WASH Facilities. 10,000 persons regained access to safe water through the rehabilitation of two solar motorized boreholes; while the capacity of the local area mechanics (LAMs) and community village level operation and maintenance (VLOM) systems were strengthened through trainings and provision of supplies.

North-east WASH response

During reporting period, awareness on COVID-19 prevention emphasizing social distancing, the use of facemasks, and hand washing through small group discussions and household visits continued. 523 posters on COVID-19 were distributed at critical places, such as - water collection points, public toilets and other common places; the estimated number of people reached is 36,845 (18,500 children; 14,157 female beneficiaries).

Up to 84,600 soaps were distributed in camps within Jere, Mafa and Kala/Balge LGAs reaching a total 14,100 beneficiaries (7,332 female). 152 handwashing stations were provided for a minimum of 15,200 beneficiaries in 10 IDP camps and one host community in Dikwa, Jere, MMC and Gwoza.

In Adamawa state, 15 risk communication posters were distributed to Daware IDP camp in Fufore LGA to support COVID-19 awareness and prevention, while 210 soap tablets were distributed to 35 persons in one IDP host community to promote hand hygiene measures to prevent the spread of COVID-19. In addition, UNICEF supported the training of 19 LGA PHCs, three RUWASSA and five Burial Teams in Adamawa state on decontamination and disinfection services to eliminate the spread of COVID-19.

Nutrition

252 health facilities (HF) continued to provide community-based management of acute malnutrition (CMAM) services and have treated a total of 135,716 children (6 – 59 months) with severe acute malnutrition (SAM) since March 2020, including 11,200 SAM children in the last two weeks.² The SAM children have continued to receive two weekly supplies of ready-to-use therapeutic foods (RUTF) and observe COVID-19 prevention measures. UNICEF continues to provide nutrition supplies, quality nutrition services delivery, remote monitoring, data management and reporting through daily telephone calls, SMS and virtual review meetings. Bauchi state provided capacity building of 38 health workers (HW) on the integrated health and nutrition program in the context of COVID-19.

A total of 1,528,172 caregivers of children aged 0-23 months have been reached with messages on infant and young child feeding (IYCF) since March 2020, including 107,640 caregivers in the last two weeks aiming to protect breastfeeding and proper complementary feeding in the context of COVID-19, through interpersonal communication

by HWs, use of Pico Projectors to carry out food demonstrations and IYCF messages.

Radio jingles on recommended IYCF practices in the context of COVID-19 through NOA continued to run in some states and in Niger State the programme will run through out July in English and Hausa through Radio Niger, while airing of 13 episodes of radio drama series for integrated PHC services including nutrition will be aired in Alheri DITV Hausa and Beraikatai family radio-English from July-September 2020.

Most states continued to integrate micronutrient supplementation to routine health services delivery and some states are carrying out house to house delivery. 19,386 women and adolescent girls received iron and folic acid (IFA) or multiple micronutrient supplement (MMS) during this reporting period.

North-east Nutrition response

COVID-19 infection control and prevention measures were implemented in tandem with regular nutrition services in all the LGA supported by UNICEF in Borno and Yobe States. These included:

- In Borno, caregivers in the community were taken through a series of sensitization sessions by Community Nutrition Mobilizers on COVID-19 prevention using IEC materials (posters) in seven southern Borno LGAs. A total of 93,215 (28,797 males and 64,418 females) caregivers were reached with this information in Borno.
- In Yobe, community mobilization focused on supporting mother/caregivers of children aged 6-59 months in eight LGAs to carry out Mid-Upper Arm Circumference (MUAC) screening at home in COVID-19 context and reached 202, 848 (105,117 males and 115,731 females).
- 278 UNICEF supported HFs provided services and reached a total of 49,576 boys and girls aged 6-59 months with SAM in Borno and Yobe.
- A total of 91,417 pregnant women and caregivers of boys and girls aged 0-23 months benefitted from counselling on optimal IYCF through community-based mother to mother support groups and skilled counselling at nutrition facilities.

Education

UNICEF is focussing on the development of a mechanism to monitor access to home-based learning. This will support the measurement of learning outcomes and parental perceptions assessment for safe school reopening. Telephonic surveys, U-report, WhatsApp's, local volunteers engaged in monitoring the critical indicators being conducted in select LGAs. Face to face advocacy and virtual advocacy meetings were held with Adamawa and Gombe State Universal Basic Education Boards (SUBEB) to leverage funds from Teacher Professional Development Programmes (TPD) for the sustainability of home-based radio and TV programmes. The sum of N30 million was approved to each State to sustain the programming. State governments are also supported in back to school campaigns and designing of remedial learning and catch-up programs when schools

reopen to revise content learned on distance learning platforms.

Support was also provided to ensure continuing learning for the children from *Almajiri* communities. High-level inter-sectoral meeting with four Kano State Commissioners (Education, Women Affairs, Religious Affairs, Health) conducted to strengthen coordination on the repatriation of the *Almajiris* and the abolishment of *Almajiri* system of education in the State.

North-east Education response

UNICEF, along with partners, supported the broadcasting of home-based learning programmes for Basic Education level through Radio and TV in Bauchi, Borno Yobe and Adamawa States reaching over three million children. Additionally, 1500 radio sets were distributed and radio clubs were formed across LGAs in north-east Nigeria to promote radio-based learning reaching over 300,000 most marginalised children. Additionally, 1,000 out-of-school children (OOSC) have been targeted with home-based learning in Borno State. They have been provided with hand wash stations, hand sanitisers, facemasks and writing materials. Graduate teachers from the University of Maiduguri have been attached to learning clusters in the communities of the OOSC.

Child Protection

In Kaduna State, of the total 2,406 *Almajiri* children registered and reunited with their families, 477 were provided with psychosocial support. In Gombe, over 30 government and CSO case workers (including eight women) were virtually trained on case management, child protection information management system (CPIMS) and mobile reporting to ensure sustained and quality data collection on violence against children (VAC) in times of COVID-19. Beyond building staff capacity and bringing key actors together, this training allowed for the update of the CPIMS dashboard on the number of *Almajiri* received from other States.

Community dialogues were conducted in Sokoto with 137 participants (of whom 56 were women), including religious

leaders, to provide sensitization on violence against children, harmful practices and child protection (CP) concerns attached to COVID-19 as part of the Spotlight Initiative. Integrated child protection messaging on EndVAC, EndVAWG and birth registration during COVID-19 were disseminated to religious and traditional leaders, and other community stakeholders across three LGAs in Cross River by the State Ministry of Humanity and Social Welfare, the Ministry of Women Affairs, Nigeria Police Force and the Child Protection Network with support from UNICEF. This advocacy was supported by further airing of child protection radio jingles (birth registration, child abuse and family time) in Cross River and Ebonyi States.

North-east Child Protection response

A total of 2,490 children and adolescents (1,820 boys, 670 girls) and 635 community members (360 women, 275 men) were reached with community-based psychosocial support (CBPSS) through house-to-house campaign and mobile phones, in IDP camps and host communities. The activities conducted included life-skill sessions for adolescent boys and girls and regular PSS activities for younger children through storytelling, drawing, painting, sports and games.

UNICEF facilitated the training of 22 child protection community volunteers and social workers (11 men, 11 women) on GenderBased violence (GBV) risk mitigation and referral mechanisms for survivors as well as COVID-19 community awareness. A total of 4,253 persons (837 boys, 964 girls, 1,937 women and 515 men) from north-east Nigeria were reached with prevention of sexual exploitation and abuse (PSEA) messages through posters on how to access safe and secure reporting channels for allegations of sexual exploitation and abuse. The PSEA reporting channel received 25 calls from the dedicated phone lines from Borno, Adamawa, and Yobe: most calls were made to confirm the number, seek more information on PSEA, report cases of GBV (a small number) and request support with humanitarian services. The programme distributed 8,392 posters for PSEA awareness creation in camps and host communities (8,365 to Yobe State and 27 in Borno state, included 3,748 in English, 14 in Kanuri, and 4,630 in Hausa).

Adaptations to ongoing UNICEF programmes

A high-level meeting with Legal Professional Groups including the Nigeria Bar Association (NBA) and Federation of International Women Lawyers (FIDA) was organized to promote a Child-Friendly Justice System in Nigeria through advocacy, pro-bono legal aid, joint advocacy and capacity building. The online meeting was organized by the National Human Rights Commission with support from UNICEF and was attended by 82 representatives of the professional bodies including judges and practitioners. It was agreed that a national coalition will be set up to address the detention of children in adult facilities and to promote access to justice for child-survivors of violence, which was put as a high priority during COVID-19.

Birth registration activities were maintained in Kaduna through a virtual meeting with National population council (NPC) to provide updates on the impact of COVID-19 on birth registration and to explore interventions required to boost registration. Only 1,223 births (611 girls, 612 boys) were registered in June 2020, which is well below the standard rate of registration. The main reasons identified were the challenge for parents to bring their children to registration centres, registration officials not yet being allowed to resume work and lack of registration materials.

EndFGM and prevention of COVID-19 messages were uploaded on weekly basis on the six social media platforms to amplify states' EndFGM intervention activities - 8,704 Twitter, 6,594 Impressions and 121 retweets during the reporting period. In collaboration with the NOA, inter-generational community dialogue meetings were held in seven LGAs of the States of Oyo (77 communities), Osun (132 communities) and Ekiti (57 communities), which brought 700 participants (100 persons per LGA) divided into small

groups to accommodate social distancing requirements under COVID-19. 450 participants (100 participants per LGA, representing women, men, religious leaders, and youth groups) attended consensus building and public declaration meetings in nine LGAs across Ekiti, Osun and Oyo states. 40 law enforcement and judicial officers in two LGAs in Ebonyi and Imo States were trained on the state Violence Against Persons (Prohibition) Law (VAPP, 2018) as part of the EndFGM programme and community engagement. 11 EndFGM surveillance teams were established and trained in Ebonyi State by the NOA in collaboration with ministries of Women Affairs, Justice and Health to improve prevention and reporting of FGM and any form of violence against children. Advocacy for birth registration services was also included.

In Enugu, the essential adaptive practice was the deliberate integration of COVID-19 messaging into messaging promoting key practices other aspects of UNICEF programming for children and women. In effect, messaging on prevention of COVID-19 infection has been mainstreamed in the areas of water, sanitation and hygiene, child and maternal nutrition, child protection, basic education and different aspects of maternal, new-born and child health programmes. Data collection and monitoring tools have been amended to gather data on COVID-19 activities carried out by mobilizers. Also, engagement with religious leaders now includes sensitization and training to give information on prevention of COVID-19 as per of their sermons to their congregations.

As part of service continuity, UNICEF continues to work with partners in the implementation of planned and emerging priority interventions for child survival. UNICEF provided technical assistance for the articulation of the Global Fund response and subsequent grant making for the HIV/AIDS TB and Malaria Global Fund. UNICEF is providing technical support to conduct profiling, geospatial distribution and location mapping of the most vulnerable Adolescent Girls and Young Women and their sexual partners in three states as part of readiness for the 2020-2022 Global Fund implementation cycle.

The COVID-19 pandemic affected uptake of essential health services and coverage rates across the states due to lockdown measures and reluctance of health care workers in providing services stemming from concern of infection by health care workers. At the state level, UNICEF is supporting integrated outreaches in designated communities, that have been identified to contribute to high numbers of unimmunized children in the states, to improve coverages, actively participating in and supporting online coordination platforms to strengthen service delivery, while following COVID-19 protocols. Logistics support is also being provided for routine immunization supportive supervision. UNICEF Field Offices are supporting State Primary Health Care Development Agencies to conduct step-down vaccine management trainings at state and LGAs. UNICEF in Sokoto provided technical support in all three states (Kebbi, Sokoto & Zamfara) with volunteer community mobilizers (VCMs) conducting supportive supervision together with the state, LGA teams and partners in order to improve routine immunization

In the NE, UNICEF ensured no-stock out of essential supplies in deep field locations using United Nations Humanitarian Air Service (UNHAS) helicopters to distribute essential supplies and consumables during lockdown and movement restrictions period. To ensure safe service provision, Health and WASH Sections collaborated to strengthen hygiene and sanitation practices in health facilities in Borno State by distributing sanitation supplies in 29 health facilities.

Funding Overview and Partnerships

The Nigeria CO has developed an updated response plan outlining gaps and needs, COVID-19 proofing measures and response activities across all sections. USD 66 million is requested to support the government to respond to COVID-19 and reach an estimated 20 million Nigerians. Funds currently available amount to US\$ 33.4 million. UNICEF's ability to provide an integrated response to COVID-19 for the survival and development of vulnerable children is hampered by a 49 per cent funding gap.
