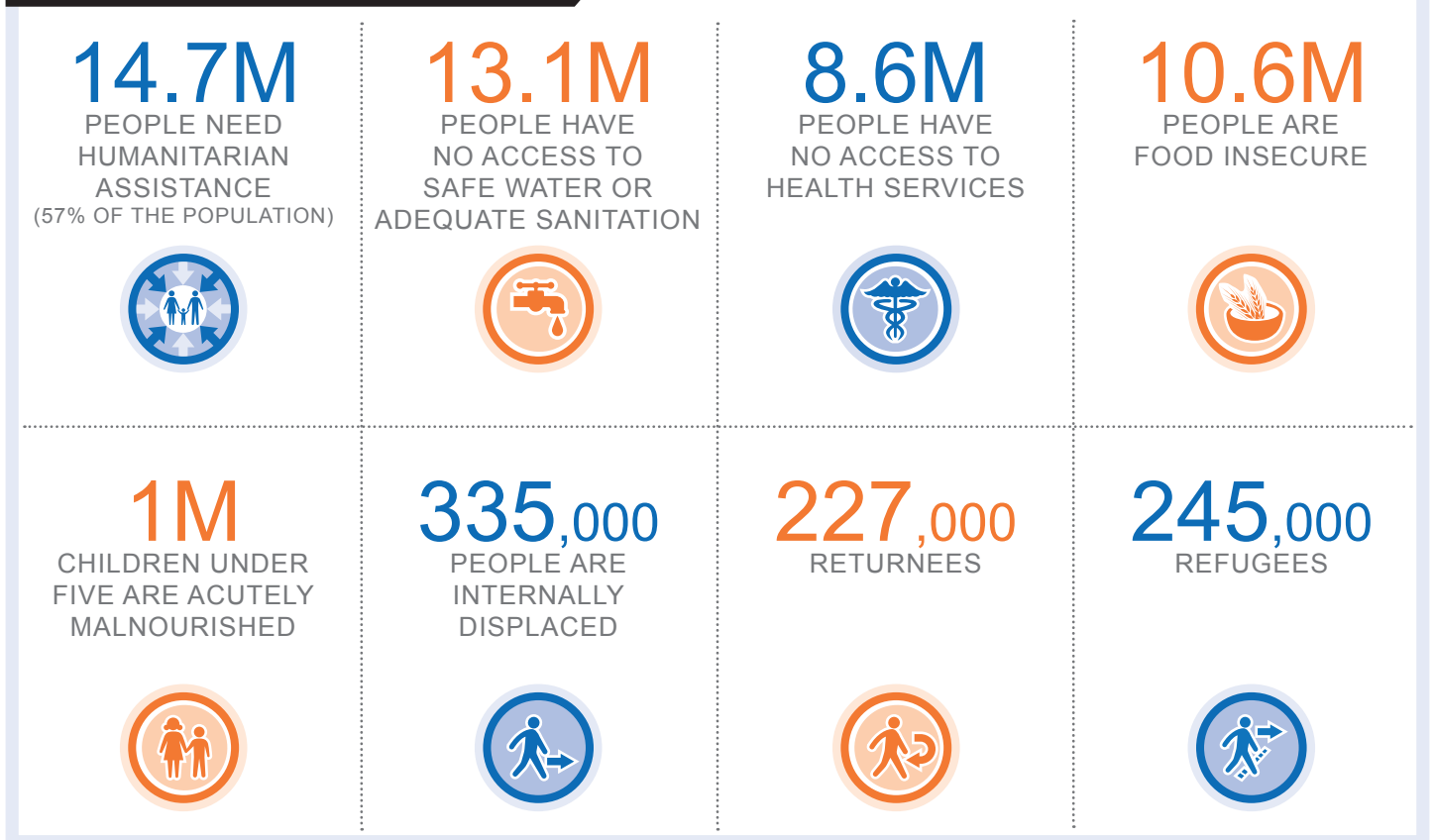




Yemen faces a large scale humanitarian emergency caused by years of under-development, poverty, lack of basic services and the absence of state authority and rule of law in many areas. At the same time, thousands of Yemeni families have had to flee their homes due to conflict this year alone. Sustainable solutions to these long-term problems require progress on political and economic reform. Meanwhile, immediate support is needed to reduce humanitarian suffering.

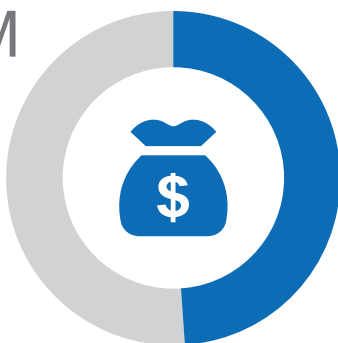

FUNDING



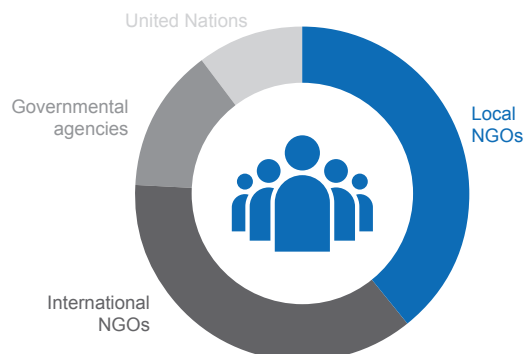
\$306M still needed this year if we are to meet the target of the response plan of providing assistance to the 7.6 million most vulnerable people.

During the conflict in Amran earlier this year, partners were able to stem a **measles** outbreak by quickly conducting a measles vaccination campaign.

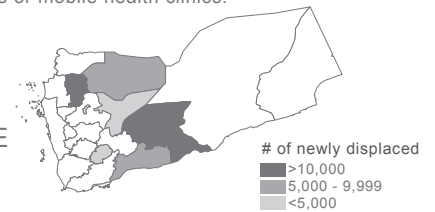

HELPING PEOPLE DISPLACED DUE TO CONFLICT

HOW TO BETTER SUPPORT HUMANITARIAN EFFORTS

FACILITATING HUMANITARIAN ACCESS

General insecurity, ongoing hostilities, roadblocks and other factors continue to restrict humanitarian access in Yemen. All actors in Yemen should be called upon to facilitate safe access of humanitarian aid workers to people in need based on the principles of neutrality, impartiality and independence.



STRENGTHENING PARTNERSHIPS AMONG ALL HUMANITARIAN ACTORS

The past three years have witnessed a surge in humanitarian actors in Yemen. By working together, we can ensure a more effective response, based on a shared analysis of needs and pooled capacity to reach more people in need across the country.



PROVIDING FINANCIAL SUPPORT THROUGH THE YEMEN HUMANITARIAN RESPONSE PLAN

Less than half the humanitarian appeal has been funded, leaving major gaps that not only threaten the sustainability of humanitarian efforts, but also pose a serious risk that people, especially children, will die from malnutrition and from preventable or curable diseases.
