




SITUATION OVERVIEW

It is estimated that 4.3 million people in Niger are chronically food-insecure and unable to meet their basic food requirements even during years of average agricultural production. During periods of constrained access to food, millions more can quickly fall into acute transitory food insecurity. Over-reliance on subsistence rain-fed agriculture and animal husbandry, widespread poverty, limited infrastructure, low levels of education, and limited effective coverage of basic services, aggravated by high population growth, high levels of indebtedness, and recurrent crises, have weakened the resilience of the most vulnerable people.

The situation of children is of particular concern with 1.005.000 children under the age of 5 acutely malnourished. The national prevalence of global acute malnutrition among children 6-59 months reached 13.3 percent nationwide, exceeding the emergency threshold of 15 percent Maradi region. Historic trends indicate that even during non-crisis years, rates of acute malnutrition can rapidly peak beyond emergency thresholds during the lean season period, when food access is most constrained.



STRATEGIC OBJECTIVES

- 2 Support vulnerable populations to better cope with shocks by responding to warning signals in advance, reducing the duration of post-crisis recovery and strengthening the capacity of national actors.
- 3 Provide people in emergency situations a coordinated and integrated assistance they need to survive.

FOOD SECURITY



Provision of improved access to food to people in crisis, provision of seasonal livelihood inputs to people in crisis and stressed, and regular and predictable safety nets programmes that protect vulnerable people.

Needs


- 3,3 million most vulnerable people require immediate improved household access to food.
- 800.000 are in need of 60 146 tons of food. While
- 500.000 households needs 3.000 tons of seed,

Response

- The approved WFP's Protracted Relief and Recovery Operations (PRRO) will safeguard lives, boot food security and nutrition, and build resilience
- The cluster partners are planning to reach 3,3 million people that are food insecure by end Sept.

NUTRITION



Ensure access to quality nutrition through service provision focused around an integrated management of acute malnutrition programme.

Needs


- Around 1,6 million children are acutely manourished in Niger, among them 356.324 are severely malnourished and require sustained nutrition interventions. In addition, about 144.609 pregnant and lactating mothers need sustained nutritional support

Response

- Since January 2014, the cluster has reached 364.396 children under age of 5. Among them 155.799 were severely malnourished, while 208.597 were moderately malnourished.

MULTI-SECTOR



A total of 62.908 vulnerable refugees, asylum-seekers and migrant, as well as nigeriens returning from Mali and Nigeria, are in need of saving-life services.

Needs


- Post-arrival assistance and humanitarian relief assistance, such as NFIs, food items, medical care, Educaton, etc., at entry points and transit centres for refugees and returnees from Mali and Nigeria

Response

- 52.317 Malians and 14.707 Nigerians received post-arrival assistance, including 40.564 returnees assisted by UNHCR

WATER, SANITATION AND HYGIENE



Provision of safe water, sanitation services and promotion of hygiene for affected people (droughts, floods, Cholera)

Needs


- 356.324 childrens severely malnourished are in need of clean water, sanitation and hygiene. In addition, 250,000 living in areas with high risk of cholera need drinking water structures. It is also estimated that approximately 225,000 people living in flo

Response

- Since January 2014, about 254,000 have benefited from WASH packages in Nut in Therapeutic Feeding Centre.

HEALTH



An estimated 1,5 million people have limited access to health services in addition to shortage of qualified medical staff and availability of equipment in health facilities.

Needs

- Life-saving humanitarian assistance and basic health services are the most urgent needs. The primary focus is to meet the most basic health needs of vulnerable groups, namely returnees, refugees, women and children

Response

- The cluster is monitoring the trend of communicable diseases, allowing early detection and timely response

SHELTER/NFI



Three pillars reflecting each of the overarching shelter needs: emergency response, transitional shelter and support for durable solutions.

Needs

- The priority for emergency assistance are newly displaced people affected by floods victims and homeless returnees.

Response

- pre-positioning in strategic areas 4 256 tents and 800 standard and specific NFI kits to 800 families, 3808 people from flood victims 2013 Diffa region in total 45.919 total direct and indirect beneficiaries
