


## SITUATION OVERVIEW

From January to December 2016, national and international humanitarian partners have reached 5.6 million people with some form of direct humanitarian assistance across Yemen's 22 governorates. This has been accomplished despite continued conflict and access constraints imposed by the parties to the conflict.

Lack of funds has also limited the response. The 2016 Humanitarian Response Plan received 60 per cent funding against the 1.6 billion appeal to date.

Improve immediate household availability of and access to food for the most vulnerable people in Yemen.

### Needs

The food security situation in Yemen continued to deteriorate over 2016. Approximately 51% of the population (14 million Yemenis) are food insecure with 7 million severely food insecure. Food insecurity is expected to further deteriorate due to conflict-induced scarcity of basic commodities, the liquidity crisis, disruption of imports, the high price of essential commodities and dwindling livelihoods and income opportunities.

### Response

An average of 3.8 million people per month were reached with regular emergency food assistance between January to December 2016; close to 484,000 people received emergency livelihoods assistance; and almost 45,000 persons received longer-term livelihoods asset support. The main challenges in 2016 were active conflict, bureaucratic impediments, the liquidity crisis, reduced food imports and funding shortages (only 59% of the requirement was met).

Provide comprehensive, essential and life-saving healthcare services to affected and vulnerable populations; reinforce health system and strengthen resilience, livelihoods, and early recovery activities.

### Needs

The conflict produced a financial crisis affecting health services and disrupting health systems. Throughout 2016, the Ministry of Public Health and Population, and health partners tried to fill the gaps within the health sector to keep basic health services available. Fuel, water and electricity in health facilities remain major needs, while outbreaks of measles and cholera have resulted in high numbers of morbidity, with some mortality. Primary health care services have remained low due to non-functioning health facilities (55% as per the last assessment), shortage of trained personnel, lack of essential medicines/supplies, and prolonged import restrictions.

### Response

Cluster partners were able to reach over 5.5 million individuals with 59% funding requirements in 2016. 414 health facilities were operationally supported in 145 districts; 341 communicable disease interventions were implemented in 229 districts; 406 surgical, nutrition, and mobile medical interventions were conducted in 266 districts; 97 general clinical and trauma interventions were done in 73 districts; and 541 child health and nutrition interventions were conducted in 323 districts. The Health Cluster together with the WASH Cluster closely collaborated to jointly combat the cholera outbreak that started in October 2016.

Deliver quality lifesaving nutrition services for children under 5 and pregnant and lactating women through Community-Based Management of Acute Malnutrition (CMAM) and Infant and Young Child Feeding (IYCF) services as well as prevent malnutrition through provision of micronutrient, and blanket supplementary feeding for children under 2.

### Needs

2016 saw the increase in nutritional needs across the population. Nearly 3 million people (74% children under 5 and 26% pregnant and lactating women) require humanitarian nutrition assistance. Almost 1.3 million children are acutely malnourished of whom 370,000 are severely malnourished.

### Response

In 2016, Nutrition Cluster partners reached over 1.2 million people, including children under 5 and pregnant and lactating women, with critical lifesaving nutrition interventions. Treatment for severe acute malnutrition has surpassed the target, reaching 236,275 children under 5. Also 266,873 children with moderate acute malnutrition have been treated in nutrition centres. Moreover, 199,807 pregnant and lactating women received nutritional support.

Provide adequate shelter for displaced persons in liveable and dignified settings.

### Needs

More than 4.5 million people require shelter/non-food items (NFIs) assistance, and support to self-management of collective centres in which they are living. Of these people, 3.9 million are in acute need. Large numbers of displaced persons are still living in conditions that heighten their vulnerabilities such as in the open, in unfinished buildings, in substandard shelters, schools and other public facilities, and in overcrowded settings. The protracted conflict is stretching affected people's coping capacity beyond their limits, and the resilience of host communities is steadily deteriorating.

### Response

In 2016, over 1 million individuals were reached with NFIs, cash or in-kind distributions (including assistance during the winter session); 291,163 individuals were assisted with in-kind or cash for Emergency Shelter kits/materials; 18,826 individuals benefited from the support of cash for rental subsidies; and 39 IDP collective centres were rehabilitated. Also, 12,914 individuals were reached through the rehabilitation of their damaged houses.

Address the education concerns of populations affected by humanitarian crises in a predictable and well-coordinated manner.

### Needs

There is an urgent need for learning supplies and textbooks, establishment of temporary learning spaces and rehabilitation of conflict-affected schools. Also psychosocial support for students and teachers is needed. 2.3 million people including students, parents, and teachers require support to ensure that crisis-affected children are able to attend school.

### Response

During 2016, schools affected by conflict have been rehabilitated, along with their WASH facilities in 16 governorates. Cluster partners supported the distribution of school bags and textbooks in many governorates, benefiting around 778,000 students. School desks have been provided or repaired, reaching more than 108,000 students. Psychosocial support training has been conducted for teachers in 16 governorates. With the acquired skills, teachers will be able to reach around 422,000 students.

Provision of immediate life-saving services and direct protection assistance to migrants and refugees.

### Needs

Migrants and refugees are in need of immediate assistance such as food, WASH, health, temporary shelter, and protection. From January to December, 107,117 migrants, asylum seekers and refugees were estimated to have newly arrived in Yemen, crossing the Red and Arabian Seas.

### Response

Partners provided a range of humanitarian assistance to refugees and migrants. The response for migrants included identifying vulnerabilities and providing immediate assistance to unaccompanied minors, Gender Based Violence (GBV cases) and victims of human rights violations. The response for refugees also included the provision of food, water, NFIs, shelter, and health.



Logistics support to emergency supply of fuel, storage, road, sea and air transport assistance.

### Needs

Humanitarian organisations responding to the crisis in Yemen face a number of specific challenges that impede their ability to deliver relief items, such as: limited access to some conflict areas; inadequate or damaged infrastructure; congestion at main entry points; unreliable and unpredictable access to fuel and high volatility of its price; bureaucratic processes; and limited international shipping options, both by sea and air.

### Response

The Logistics Cluster supported the humanitarian community to facilitate, coordinate and ensure effective and efficient delivery of life-saving relief items to affected populations in Yemen. It did this through support to coordination and information management access to transport (overland, sea and air), fuel provision and storage. Additionally, the Logistics Cluster facilitated a sea-passenger service between Djibouti and Aden (648 passengers transported in 2016).

Support the repair and maintenance of affected WASH systems, and direct provision of WASH services and items to affected people.

### Needs

In 2016, water and sanitation systems and infrastructure further deteriorated, and WASH partners worked hard to prevent these systems from collapsing. IDPs, returnees and host communities continued to raise WASH as their priority need. The deteriorating WASH conditions in the past year contributed to disease outbreaks such as cholera, dengue and scabies. The rainy season was particularly strong and caused flooding in April and June-Aug, affecting 130,000 people.

### Response

WASH support reached a total of 6.9 million people in 2016. WASH partners supported water and sanitation systems, reaching an estimated population of 4.7 million, mainly in urban areas. 1.4 million people benefitted from water trucking in 16 governorates across the country. Almost 650,000 people received a hygiene kit and 164,000 people gained access to a latrine. Most vulnerable IDPs and host communities were prioritized in the response. This included communities with high malnutrition rates and cholera cases.

Monitoring & assistance to persons with specific needs; multi-sectoral GBV response services; monitoring of grave child rights violations; life-saving services for conflict-affected children.

### Needs

The protection needs/risks include: civilian death or injury; freedom of movement; civil status documents; psychological trauma; inability to meet protection-specific needs; displacement-related rights and availability of humanitarian assistance; GBV i.e. sexual & domestic violence, forced marriages, denial of resources, psychological abuse; grave child rights violations i.e. children killed or maimed, exposure to landmines, recruitment & use of children as soldiers, attacks against schools & hospitals; separation from families, child trafficking & psychological distress.

### Response

Protection & human rights/IHL monitoring; support to CBPNs; provision of legal, psychosocial and cash assistance; awareness raising and capacity building activities. GBV response: psychosocial support; medical & legal assistance; emergency shelter and livelihood support; dignity kits & GBV awareness raising. CP response: monitoring of grave violations of child rights; psychosocial support; mine risk education; family tracing and reunification; victim assistance and rehabilitation support for injured children.

Protect communities from the threat of mines and Unexploded Ordnance (UXO), reduce risks rising from undisposed waste and strengthen local economies and infrastructure.

### Needs

New landmine/unexploded ordnance (UXO) contamination is registered in more than 15 governorates, some of which are at critical levels. Households' access to savings has halved and access to social welfare benefits decreased by two-thirds compared to pre-escalation of conflict levels.


### Response

Mine Action was operational in 11 Governorates, clearing over 240,000 Explosive Remnants of War (ERW), and deployed 551 demining team personnel with a focus on high impact areas bringing a positive impact to the lives of 3.7 million Yemenis. Over 12,500 individuals directly benefited from emergency employment schemes. This activity, together with business recovery, provided critical income to help vulnerable families cope with the crisis with dignity. 49,452 tons of solid waste were collected in the largest cities to enable movement of goods, commodities, people and improve humanitarian access.

## EMERGENCY TELECOMMUNICATIONS

Provide life-saving telecommunications, data services and power charging stations to support humanitarian action and increase staff safety.

### Needs

The need remains for internet services in operational hubs and on the inter-agency mission boat. Reliable security telecommunications services are required by humanitarians to carry out their activities on the ground in a safe manner. After a user satisfaction survey conducted by the ETC at the end of 2016, the ETC is evaluating the need to deploy solar-powered charging stations.

### Response

Humanitarian operations across the Yemen are being supported with connectivity and backup services. With particular attention around the hubs to strengthen humanitarian presence closer to affected populations, all hubs are currently serviced.
