Yemen Operation Overview 1 April - 30 June 2017



Highlights

- The ongoing conflict in Yemen makes access extremely difficult both for humanitarian staff and relief goods. As the
 cholera outbreak adds to the scale of the response, logistics support is required to ensure humanitarian
 organisations responding to the crisis can deliver efficient and effective assistance to the affected population.
- The Logistics Cluster facilitates access to common logistics services (temporary storage; air, sea and overland transport; fuel distribution), and ensures coordination and Information Management to maximise the use of available resources in-country, and avoid duplication of efforts.

Access to Common Services

- From April through the end of June 2017, the Logistics Cluster facilitated overland transport of 489 mt/669 m³ of relief items inside Yemen.
- During the same period, transport of 73 mt/494 m³ of humanitarian goods from Djibouti to Aden was facilitated on board of the WFP-chartered vessel VOS Apollo.
- The Logistics Cluster has been coordinating access to combined chartered airlifts offered to the humanitarian community by WFP Aviation. From 1 April to 30 June, 68 mt/194 m³ of relief items were airlifted from Djibouti to Sana'a, on behalf of six organisations.
- In the last three months, the Logistics Cluster facilitated storage for 731 mt/2,412 m³ of relief items, in three hubs of Sana'a, Hodeida and Aden.

Cholera Response

- In response to the devastating cholera epidemic that has swept across Yemen, the Logistics Cluster is in the process of augmenting its capacity to ensure the additional logistics requirements are met quickly and efficiently.
- Along with the regular monthly airlifts, four additional airlifts dedicated to the cholera response are being made available to the humanitarian community. The first, on 19 June transported 23 mt/84 m³ of cholera supplies on behalf of MSF and Medecins du Monde. The second, planned for 12 July, will carry 139 mt of cargo on behalf of WHO, Save the Children International, UNICEF, World Relief Germany and Oxfam. The third rotation, planned for the end of July, will be for approximately 120 mt of WASH and cholera equipment on behalf of Oxfam, UNICEF, MSF, ACF, WHO and Partnership for Supply Chain Management.
- As of 15 July, for an initial period of four months, a refrigerated container to provide cold chain transport from Djibouti to Aden is available on board the VOS Apollo.
- A contract is in place to provide transport from Djibouti to Hodeida on dhows; 400 to 500 mt capacity is available for humanitarian responders upon request.
- Five trucks are available for urgent transport (three in Aden and two in Sana'a), including a reefer in each location for cold chain transport. This capacity can be increased if required.
- WFP is contracting a 5,000 m² warehouse compound in Aden. Based on requirements from humanitarian
 organisations, the Logistics Cluster can potentially scale up in this location with mobile refrigerated containers for
 short term use.
- To increase common storage capacity, an additional MSU will be established in Sana'a.




Fuel Distribution

To enable organisations responding to the crisis to establish an uninterrupted supply chain supporting the
delivery of relief items to the affected population, the Logistics Cluster facilitated the distribution of 333,572
litres of fuel (111,518 litres of diesel and 222,054 litres of petrol) from WFP Distribution Points in Sana'a,
Hodeidah and Aden to 19 organisations.

Passenger Transport

- From April to June, 322 passengers, from 25 organisations, were transported between Djibouti and Aden on board the WFP-chartered vessel VOS Apollo. A more complete overview of the service is available at:

- Thanks to the contributions received by ECHO, Canada and DFID, WFP will be able to extend the service until 15 November 2017.

Coordination & Information Management

- The Logistics Cluster held six coordination meetings, three in Sana'a, two in Aden and one in Djibouti, with 34 organisations attending (8 UN agencies, 25 INGOs and 1 national NGO).
- 36 Information Management (IM) products were shared through the mailing list and on the dedicated webpage, including access constraints maps, meeting minutes and SOPs.
